It is my further will and desire that my executors should not offer this instrument of writing for probate unless to do so in the after my death to prove and sell their effects and pay as though this was recorded as they termed them best and prudent. I do hereby appoint my trustee and writing friends Lemmon, Johnson & Mogill by Whitethorn Esq: executors to my last will and testament. In the name of God amen. I Luke Smithwick of the County of Martin and province of South Carolina calling to mind the Mortality of the body and knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die do make & ordain this my last will & testament in manner and form following, viz. First & principally I Command my executors into the hands of Almighty God that give it my body to be decently interred at the discretion of my executors and at a time & place & in a suitable & decent manner as it shall please God to bless me with. I will & bequeath in manner following, viz. Item I will & bequeath to my son Joel one Mileways or tract of land beginning at a pine Smithwick & Peale corner thence down the Lanius Course of the Creek to the mouth of a small branch so as to include the Harris, cabin Islands thence the Meanderings of the branch to Lanier line thence along Lanier line to a pine corner thence along Perry line to John Reddick's line thence the various corners of his line to the first Station (one acre excepted,) one Con & Calf. One Bed & furniture Item I give to my son Humphrey one hundred & fifty acres of Land lying on the west side of the little Creek one Con & Calf one bed & furniture. Item I give to my son John the Mann plantation wherein I live one Con & Calf. One bed & furniture. My will and desire is that my wife should have the use of all the land during her lifetime or Widewidow. Item I give to my daughter Polly one Negro Boy called Dan one Con & Calf. One bed & furniture. Item I give to my daughter Nancy one Negro Boy called Harry one Con. Half one bed & furniture. Item I give all the remainder of my property both within doors & without to my living wife during her lifetime or Widewidow. provided it is thought by trustees to be a prudent application of the property to the use of the family. My will & desire is that if my negroes should increase sufficient that my boys should have a young Negro a piece and the remainder if any to be equally divided among them all. My will and desire is that my Person land should be sold by my executors to the best advantage and the money so arising to pay my just debts and the remainder if any to be put to the use of my family. I like wise Command & appoint my living friends Edmund Smithwick & Leah Perry my whole and sole Executors to this my last will & testament disannulling all others by me made in writing whereof I have hereunto set my hand & seal this 30th day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and six. I, Luther E. Moore do make and publish this my last will and Testament being of sound mind and memory

I wish and direct that my Corp be planted to earth and interred under the direction of my Father and under his supervision

Second Out of the corp thus made and interred I wish and direct that a sufficient Sheriff be elected for the support against my wife for one year

Third I am now in debt to my father so money borrowed and the debt is mutual between us and I cannot specify the amount or when due him but I wish him to retain out of the corp thus obtained to pay him the sum of two hundred dollars for his trouble and his services which I think will be less than four hours but with which he will be satisfied

Fourth out of the corp aforesaid I wish and direct my son to pay all the expenses incurred in culturing the same including the compensation of the overseer

Fifth I owe my son to me Sam Henry 100\$ for the hire of his negroes I have paid and remitted the same and the business is unsettled between us. She and her family are part of my family and they are to be supported in a fashion of my friends and oft. even support for the balance of the year. I think the sum of four hundred dollars will be about the same sum he will acknowledge and direct the same shall be paid

Sixth I hereby appoint my father John Moore executor of this my last will and Testament and I enclose prints that he can file under the Seal of Court where I have made out the copies of those executed on the twentieth of next otherwise by his
