Martin County In the name of God I William A. Williams
of the State and County aforesaid calling unto mind that it is appointed
for all men to die do make this my last Will & Testament, a manner
and form as I shall hereafter mention.

I will & do command my soul into the hands of Almighty
God, when first you stone, and my body to be decently buried as
you give and bequeath unto my son Leonard Williams
the following piece of land, beginning at the corner of the
of my Anderson's due, running thence up a Bottom on the east side
of the main Branch to the head of said Bottom, thence a straight
line to a Cherry tree near the above mentioned, thence a straight
line to the Rock line, between me and Rogers' land, thence along
the said dividing line to the first station, thence thence his & Rogers'
front.

I give unto my dear beloved wife Abby Williams all
the Land that bought of Henry W. Remond, & (refused being left to
the said James Remond to me for the time) also all
all the Land that I now have or ever all my Chattels and all
the rest of my property with the exception of two lots, also
during her natural life or until my son James Silvester Williams
comes twenty one years of age, and at the death of said wife
or at the age of James Silvester of twenty one years, then the
said property to be disposed of in the following manner of

My son William A. Williams to have all the Land that I
bought of Henry W. Remond, and my son James Silvester
Williams to have all my land that I now have or ever all
except that I bought of Luke James & wife Lydia James
to them & their heirs forever also at the aforesaid time for all
the balance of my property to be equally divided between my wife
if living and all my children that is Leonard Williams
William A. Williams & James Silvester Williams to them &
their heirs & spouses forever.

Also I give & bequeath unto my son Leonard C. Williams
William A. Williams Jr. One cow and calf and to them and
their heirs forever.

Also It is my will and desire that William A. Remond
the son of my wife to have one bed & furniture also one cow
& calf at any time when he thinks proper to take them
out of my Estate to him & his heirs & spouses forever.

Also at the death or at age of twenty one years of my son
Silvester to have as equal share in all my property but to my wife
with the exception of my Lands & chattels to him this heirs and spouses
forever.
