John Jefferson witnessed by my hand & seal this  
26<sup>th</sup> day of September 1823.

In the Name of God Amen. July 27<sup>th</sup> 1825.  
I Catherine Wallace of the County of Rockbridge in  
State of N<sup>t</sup> Carolina being in a low state of health, but  
of sound mind & knowing that it is appointed for all  
to die, Do make & ordain this my last Will, which  
is as follows. After my death I allow my body to  
be buried in a decent Christian like manner at  
the discretion of my executors including a shroud  
for my grave worth ten or twelve dollars. . . .  
I bequeath to my brother Matthew Wallace twenty  
dollars; I give & bequeath to my niece Catherine  
Wallace Twenty five dollars & all my body cloa-  
ding including two unfinished buck gaiters with  
the materials for making them out. I give to my  
& Catherine Wallace my brothers daughters to be  
equally divided between them. I bequeath to  
John H Wilson Twenty dollars, and I also  
five dollars for the use of Rutherford Church for  
to be applied toward the building of a meeting  
house

I also Give to my nephew Alexander Wallace  
 Twenty dollars & all my house furniture & bedding  
 (with the exception of the two unfinished guitars  
 as above) & also all the cattle I might have  
 any claim to, together with my books & any  
 thing else that might be mine on the farm or  
 in the house; I also give to my nephew Alexander  
 Wallace that small tract of land on the waters of  
 Kittatinny creek on which I formerly lived pur-  
 chased from William & John Black containing  
 Twenty three acres & one half - and I appoint  
 John Wilson & Alexander Wallace to execute  
 this my last will, done in the presence of  
 George Wilson      } Catherine Wallace &  
 William McMaxwell } 

In the name of God Amen. I Hugh Walker of  
 the County of Hunterdon & State of N<sup>t</sup> Jersey  
 being at this time perfectly sound in mind & memory  
 though in a low state of bodily health, do make  
 this my last will & Testament as follows Viz  
 First, I will & bequeath unto my loving wife Rachel  
 Walker all my Estate real & personal except so  
 much as she may deem proper for the purpose of  
 paying all my just debts, then the residue to  
 remain in her possession during her widowhood  
 or natural life for the purpose of being her support  
 & raising & educating my children - Second, I will  
 that Rachel upon her death be equally divided among  
 my children when the sum of mature age  
 4<sup>th</sup> if my widow should think proper to marry  
 then she shall & share alike with my children  
 5<sup>th</sup> I will & allow my wife the sole right to execute
