The land on which I live to be divided into three
parts or Tracts, one of which contains 200 acres
lying & being on the Creek to belong to my son John
Jefferson, The second containing 150 acres & including
the houses to belong to my widow during her lifetime
after which time to be equally divided between
my two sons, The balance of the land containing
200 acres more or less to belong to my son James
So much of my Stock is to be sold as will be necessary
to pay my debts, I wish a Horse Cow & Calf &
good bed & furniture be given to each of my unmarried
daughters (Sam Henry who has been married) -
Upon Marriage or death of the widow until which
event, I will that the whole family boys & girls
should live with the widow who if she sees fit
is to have the power of binding the long or having

In the name of God amen. July 27th 1825.
 I Catherine Wallace of the County of Rockingham &
 State of N.C. aforesaid being in a low state of health, but
 of sound mind & knowing that it is appointed for all
 to die, do make & ordain this my last Will, which
 is as follows. After my decease I allow my body to
 be buried in a decent Christian like manner at
 the discretion of my executors including a shroud
 for my grave worth ten or twelve dollars. . . .
 I bequeath to my brother Matthew Wallace twenty
 dollars; I give & bequeath to my niece Catherine
 Wallace Twenty five dollars & all my body cloths
 including two unfinished bed quilts with
 the materials for making them out, I give to my
 & Catherine Wallace my brothers day glass to be
 equally divided between them. I bequeath to
 John H. Wilson Twenty dollars, and I allow
 five dollars for the use of Bethany Church to
 be applied toward the building of a meeting
