I Henry Mitchell do make & declare this 9th day of January
1782 that it is appropriate for all men made by God to purpose
Mind & Memory to constitute & make this my last will and
testament. And first of all I do positively will & ordain all my
just debts to be paid out of my personal estate by my executors
hereafter named. Here I do will all the land that I now possess
either of or my son Samuel. Here I do will the negro boy named
Dick to my son Samuel, but I do also will him for helping to
each boy a £100 to my grand daughter Elinor the sum of five pounds
to be paid by her to each of them at the time that may be thought
most convenient for her by my executors & guardians to be after
named. Here I do will the rest of my goods and chattels to my daughter
Mary. Here I do will my son Samuel £100, these daughters Mary
Elinor & Sarah each of them to be proportioned at the discretion of
my executors & guardians as near equal to my two daughters &
Abigail that are providers for the estate till all of them do die.
In proportion to my grand daughter Eliza. To allow the
same to be paid till the time of her marriage. Here I do direct
that such day & date to be sent to all except death things are to remain
to the family Time of her marriage. Here I do direct the sum of my
estate to be disposed of at the discretion of my executors & guardians
as the necessities of any of the legatees may require. Here I do hereby
constitute & appoint my son Samuel & my son John Hall Robison &
Eliza & Eliza the wife of Robert Baldwin & Samuel Harris Grand &

In the name of God Amen, I James McGill of the County of Westmoreland
& State of Carolina, being in a sick & low condition of body but in a
perfect & regular course of mind & reason of this my last will & Testament
indorse this my last will & Testament & desire it may be received by
all concerned as such. First I will & beg leave to my dear &
loving wife, either after my first death or regularly discharged, do
one third part of all my personal Estate to her manag'd the Re-
maining two thirds of my personal Estate to remain in the hands
of my executors & majority of them may think right hereafter
named during her life to supply her in her necessities as my execu-
tors a majority of them may think right & least she being & all living
under the direction & subject to the Council & government of my Country
as long as she remains my widow after the said two thirds or
what balance may be in hand, I will & desire my executors, Boyd
& Co. & my trustees find my personal estate insufficient to support
my widow then they are to have recourse to my real estate as far as
they may deem necessary. As to my Real estate I will & recommend
that said executors of the late Sir John & being in the County of Lincoln
in long creek containing one hundred & fifty four acres to my nephew
Thomas Boyd to his only son & heir apparent after the decease of my
widow - as to the tract of land lying in the backwoods which descended
from John Gillispie I will & bequeath it to my trustees, power to
divide it by sale to the best advantage or opportunity they may have
the common or public price of said tract of land lying on Camp Creek south
Carolina, I will & bequeath to the above named Mary Boyd & should
she die before the decease of my widow then her share to be divided
among said Mary Boyd & their & her equally. Then, also
I will & bequeath my heavy black bell and sound the same
from Robert & Hugh McIlwain to be the property of the town of
