Moreover, I do give & bequeath to the said Joseph Brewster all sum or sums that may arise from the collection of both my Public & private debts — and unto Col Thomas Palk I give & bequeath the improved lot & the negroes Sam & Thane — But in case my said Daughter Martha Brewster shall not die at the age of minority before mentioned, then & in that case the several Bequests & directions shall continue & remain as before & as that I directed in relation to the above mentioned provisions I do hereby declare, constitute & appoint my worthy Father in law Col Thomas Palk my beloved Brother Thos Brewster & the Reverend Thomas Westall to be the Executors of this my last Will & Testament, confiding in their affection & fidelity & also in their zeal for the Interest of a bereaved Orphan & rest assured of their honest & honorable attention to the welfare of the Infant now committed to their care — I do declare this to be my last Will & Testament, and do hereby cancel & revoke & void all other Wills & Testaments by me heretofore made, and do this 20th day of July 1781.
