mind & memory thank be given unto God therefore, calling unto mind the  
mortality of my body & knowing that it is appointed for all men once to  
die, do make & declare this my last will & Testament, that is to say  
Principally & first of all I give & recommend my soul unto the hand of  
almighty God the I give it, my body & command to be earth to be  
buried in a decent Christian burial at the discretion of my executors  
nothing obstructing but at the general Resurrection I shall receive the  
same again by the mighty power of God, and as touching such worldly  
estate whatsoever it has pleased God to bestow in this life I give, devise  
& dispose of the same in the following manner & form. First I give &  
bequeath to my daughter Anne Lemon, also to my  
son Joseph also to my daughter Elizabeth constable widow & wife of  
my late Executor of this my last will & Testament. And I do hereby utterly  
disinherit, Release & discharge all & every other person, Testament, will,  
Powers, legacies Executed by me in any wise before heared, will'd &  
bequeathed, Ratifying & confirming this & no other to be my last will &  
testament the witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand & seal the  
day & year above written — — signed sealed published pronounced and  
delivered to the said Joseph whom as his last will & Testament in the  
presence of us the subscribers hereto present

23 In the name of God Amen, I James & Giese being weak of body, but  
perfect mind & memory, calling to mind the mortality of my body know  
that it is appointed unto me & unto all men once to die, do make & declare  
this my last will & Testament and first I do recommend my soul unto God

desirous of my Executors to hold by teaching such worldly goods as  
hath pleased God to bless me with I desire of them in the following  
manner & form. In primis I give & bequeath to my well beloved wife  
Elizabeth one further bed & furniture, her saddle & the whole of all  
my moveable estate after my just debts are paid. & the privilege of  
living in & enjoying all the profits of this plantation on which  
I now live until my son Thomas arrives at the age of twenty-one  
Item I give & bequeath unto my well beloved son Thomas when he  
arrives at the age of twenty-one the one half of the plantation wherein  
I now live. Item I give & bequeath unto my well beloved son John when  
he arrives at the age of twenty-one years the remaining half of this  
plantation on which I now live. Item I have good reason to believe  
that my beloved wife Elizabeth is now pregnant with child. If it  
should please God to preserve it till it arrives to the age of twenty-one  
years if so I will that my two sons Thomas & John pay unto  
him the third part of what comes from the above said plantation my  
beloved wife in different manner therefore that before inventory  
son Thomas comes on his part but if a daughter I will that when  
she arrives at the age of sixteen years that they pay unto her said  
sons less than the third part of said valuation. If it so much  
pleaseth God to remove by death any of my said children before they  
arrive at full age that it is my will the survivor or survivors  
may enjoy their parts as if a daughter the proportional part as above  
and lastly I hereby nominate & appoint my beloved wife Elizabeth  
to be my beloved wife Elizabeth to be my sole Executrix of this my  
last Will & Testament, having written all that in the Notifying & confiding  
of it to my last Will & Testament in the month of January of the year of our Lord 1770  
signed, sealed, Registered & Recorded & witnessed by the said  
James W. Green artist to the last Will & Testament in presence of us
