 County being weak in Body but sound in mind & memory
 being sensible that it is appointed for all men once to die
 I discharge of my worldly substance that God has blessed
 me with as follows - First I will & bequeath to my beloved
wife Susanne Daws all the cultivated land known by the
 name of the Perry bottom on the river & all the meadow
 land joining said Land, Together with a sufficiency of
 wood land to support said Land in Timber, together with
 the two Story house & two Stables by the road & the cleared land
 south of the great road to it extends three acres into the orchard
 field - 2d I will & bequeath to my beloved wife three negroes
 named Rufus & his wife Rachel & one Negro Woman name
 Lydia with her further increase said Land & negroes I allow
 to my wife to her proper use & behoof during her natural
 life, and at her death the 111 years with their increase to be
 sold, and the proceeds ^{Mecklenburg Co. NC Wills 1783-1868} among my surviv-
 ing legatees and the said Land & Houses at her death, I
 allow to go to my son William Daws - 3d I will & bequeath
 to my wife the whole of the Kitchen furniture & the side board
 all its furniture & two beds and furniture, one Dining Table
 one set of chairs & likewise two mugs, two Count of her
 linens, two places, two pair of Goad bone spines
 for my wife to come out of what is on hand, or what is to be
 made on the plantation as may answer, That she may
 have possession of what is on hand at my death, I allow
 my wife twelve bags of her own choosing, with the same
 waggon & the tools furnished for it also the Mule & wagon
 to her & open use & behoof during her natural life that her
 death to be sold & the proceeds to be equally distributed among
 the surviving legatees -

4th. I give & bequeath to my beloved Daughter Elizabeth
 Daws one Peso -

5th. I give & bequeath to my beloved Daughter Elizabeth
 a tract of 250 acres of Land on the South side of Long

I despatch of my worldly substance that God has endowed
me with as follows - First. I will & bequeath today belind
with my wife William Davis all the cultivated land known by the
name of the Perry Bottom on the river & all the meadow
land joining said land, together with a sufficiency of
wood land to support said land in timber, together with
the two Story houses & two Stables by the road & the cleared land
South of the great road to it extends there comes into the orchard

to my wife the whole of the Kitchen furniture & the side board
all its furniture & two beds and furniture, one Dining Table

choosing, two places, two pairs of Goads & one pair
for my wife to come out of what is on hand, or what is to be
made on the plantation as may be necessary, that at end of
year's possession of what is on hand at my death, I allow
my wife twelve bags of her own choosing, with the same
waggon & the tools furnished for it also the Mule enough
to her, for open use & behoof during her natural life & at her
death to be sold & the proceeds to be equally divided among
the surviving legators -

4th. I give & bequeath to my beloved Daughter Elizabeth
Armstrong one Cow -

5th. I give & bequeath to my beloved daughter Elizabeth
Long 250 acres of Land on the South side of Long
creek known by the name of land & house & stables in
William & Long's name & also five negroes ~~lives~~
in three children to wit Dinah, & Dick & Webster
 negro girl named Leah, I give & bequeath to my daughter

Elizabeth m. Clark Green which is the new Clark House, also the
House that she formerly resided, also her Sons & wife.

I give & bequeath to my beloved Daughter Susanach Baker one half of
Calf and her Sons & wife.

I give & bequeath to my beloved Son William Davis the Plantation on
which I now live bounded as follows Beginning at 3 white Ashes
on the Bank of the River William Scott corner Green with his land
crossing the Great road to William & Cormick's line, then with
& Cormick's line, to the Creek, then up the Creek to the mouth of
the dry branch it being the line of the Hudson Land to a Black oak
corner of the Hudson Land, then with 4 of the lines of the Hudson
Land N^o 93 & 94 poles to a P.O. Then N^o 19 W 10 poles to a Stake, then N^o 16
E 48 poles to a P.O. a corner of one of the Hudson Survey, then N^o 7,
E 68 poles to a Stake, then with 4 of the division lines N^o 44 to 55.
poles to a large P.O. by the Great road, then N^o 49 E 134 poles to a pole
then S^o 87 to 62 poles to a small post Oak, then N^o 90 W 246 poles
to a P.O. on the bank of the river Mecklenburg Co. NC Mills 1783-1844 the river to the begin
ning supposed to contain 300 acres of land, all of said land
I allow to my Son William except I bequeath to my wife, should
my wife & son William Disagree, or should he treat her kindly
allow him to remove to the other house next to the river & let her
remain in possession of the House Unsettled, until her death. The
said land is to remain under her circumstances to my wife dead
after her death I allow said land & boundaries to my son William
and his Heirs forever.

I give & bequeath to my Grandson James Clark every one tract of
land which includes the Great Green mill bounded as follows
beginning at a small Hickory on the old line 20 poles from the old
Post Oak by the Branch, about 160 poles to a Stake, then S^o 65
to 20 poles to a Stake, then S^o 66 to the bank of Long Creek below
the mouth of the branch, then down to about 95 poles to a willow
& Hickory line. Then with said line then east to a P.O. at a corner
of one of the Hudson survey land, then with 3 lines of said land
S^o 18 E 90 poles to a P.O. 4 poles, then with two lines of the same
land S^o 54 E 82 poles & branch to a P.O. 4 Hickory, then S^o 27 E 54

I give & bequeath to my beloved son William Davis the plantation of
which I now live bounded as follows Beginning at 3 white oaks
on the bank of the river William Scott's corner & run with his line
crossing the great road to William & his son's line, then with
the same line to the bank, then up the bank to the mouth of
the dry branch it being the line of the Hudson land to a black oak
corner of the Hudson land, then with b of the lines of the Hudson
land N^o 99 E 34 poles to a B.O. Then N^o 19 W 10 poles to a Stake, then N^o 16
E 68 poles to a Stake, then with b of the division line N^o 44 W 55
poles to a large B.O. by the great road, then N^o 49 E 136 poles to a point
then S^o 37 W 62 poles to a small point back, then N^o 70 W 246 poles
to a B.O. on the bank of the river then down the river to the begin
ning supposed to contain 500 acres of land all of said land
I allow to my son William except I bequeath to my wife, thereby
my wife & my son William Disagree, or should he treat her kindly I
allow him to remove to the other house next to the river & let her
remain in possession of the house until her death. The
said land is to remain under her occupancy after
after her death I allow said land & hermoderis to my son William
and his Heirs forever.

8th. I give & bequeath to my grandson James M. Wiley one tract of
land which includes the Great & small mill bounded as follows
beginning at a small Hickory on the old line 20 poles from the old
Post oak by the branch it runs S^o 61 W 100 poles to a Stake, then S^o 65
W 20 poles to a Stake, then S^o 60 to the bank of Long creek below
the mouth of the branch, then down to about 95 poles to william
Wiley's line. Then with said line due East to a B.O. at a red
corner of the Henderson land, then with 3 lines of said land
S^o 18 E 36 poles to a B.O. 4 poles, then with two lines of the Pam
land S^o 54 E 82 poles to a branch to a P.C. 4 Hickory, then S^o 27 E 50
poles to a gum by the first gum branch, then up the gum branch
to his new bridge then crossing the branch to a B.O. in the road
between the spring that is a little tree former in the field made
at Henderson's creek, then down N^o 10 it strikes the bank of the hi-

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water mark, then up the creek with its various turns & passing
the old bridge along the high water mark to the old line to which
is to add the addition line, then with the addition line S. 88°
W. 116 poles to a pine the old corner, then N. 59° E. 746 poles to a P.D. old

William two acres of his own choice & standing land, &
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beginning to my Granddaughter, then give & bequeath to my son
William all the stock of living & hogs on
both my plantations except what I have bequeathed to my
wife or will afterwards name to my daughter, then I give
& bequeath to my wife my two old wagons during her
natural life and at her death to be sold & the proceeds to be
equally divided among the surviving legatees.

Item. I give & bequeath to my beloved daughter Amelia Loring
the following land, beginning at a large P.D. the old corner
by the Branch Robert Davidson corner & run with his line
N. 19 W. 206 poles to a W.D. Davidson corner, then S. 77 W. 179 poles
to a B.D. by a small branch, then N. 46 W. 78 to a large B.D.
by the branch, then N. 21 W. 96 poles to a B.D. on a Hill, then
N. 49 W. 106 poles to a B.D. & Abram Scott corner, then with 4 of
his lines, S. 15 E. 140 poles to a Stake, then N. 56 W. 92 poles to a
Stake corner near Scotts house, then S. 20 W. 126 poles to a W.D.
then N. 72 W. 114 poles to a iron wood on the river banks Scott
corner, then down the river 19 poles to a stake like Wm Davids
corner then with 4 of his lines S. 70 E. 246 poles to a small P.D.
then S. 84 E. 169 poles to a pine, then N. 49 E. 124 poles to a P.D.

to a pine tree old corner, then N 59 E 746 poles to a P.D. then S. 72 W 60 poles to a P.D.
pine, then S. 37 W 12 poles to a pine then across the road one part
of the Survey about 20 poles to a red Oak Robert Davids son
comes then with three of his sons S. 9 W 23 poles to a P.D. then S. 37
W 86 poles to a P.D. Then takes W 160 poles to a large P.D. by the branch
Davids son comes then S. 60 E 20 poles to the beginning survey
take 900 acres of Land laid out & bounded I allow to my
Grand son James H. McCoy the proprietor of said land & mills
I allow to go to my wife during her natural life and after her
death to go to my Grand son James H. McCoy as above stated
I give & bequeath to my son John Williams one thousand acres located
between Hesters & Craggs (the child) then give & bequeath to my son
William two houses of his own choice & a working field. I also
bequeath to my son William all the stock of horses & wagons on
both my plantations except what I have bequeathed to my
wife or will afterwards, same to my daughter, I have & give
thou bequeath to my wife my two old wagons during her
natural life and at her death to be sold & the proceeds to be
equally divided among the surviving legatees.

Then I give & bequeath to my beloved daughter Amelia Lanning
the following land Beginning at a large P.D. the old corner
by the branch Robert Davids comes & runs with his line

to a P.D. by a small branch, then N 46 E 1178 rods large lot
by the branch, then N 21 W 96 poles to a P.D. on a Hill, then
S. 45 E 106 poles to a P.D. a stream side the corner, then with 4 of
his sons, S. 15 E 160 poles to a Stake, then N 56 E 92 poles to a
P.D. corner near Scott's house, then S. 20 W 124 poles to a W.D.
then N 42 E 114 poles to a iron wood on the river banks Scott's
corner, then down the river 19 poles to a white oak Mr. Douglass
comes then with 4 of his sons S. 40 E 246 poles to a small P.D.
then S. 37 E 102 poles to a pine, then S. 49 E 134 poles to a P.D.
by the Great road, then S. 44 E 46 poles to a Stake on the hill
then with 4 of his sons S. 44 E 106 poles to the beginning
survey by Estimation 984 acres of land to the sum aforesaid

or less said land to be hers & her heirs forever. Item I give Elizabeth
to my Daughter Amelia bearing one negro man named Cal & one
negro girl named Nelly & also one Beck & committed them however
and two Sons & pigs.

I give Elizabeth to my Grandson Charles Government the Ballance
of the Henderson place (all that I have not heretofore willed to
my Grandson James) & Henry the said land to be under the
control of my wife or her executors until the said Charles comes
of age — Also the Ballance of the Gove place to be sold to pay off my
debts together with all the undivided property the Ballance if any
to be equally divided equally among the surviving legatees —
It is also my desire that my library of books remain with my
wife to be disposed of she may think proper & fit —

Item I will & bequeath my Silver Watch to William Government my
son in law — I do hereby nominate & appoint Joseph
Blackwood, John Black & William H. King the executors
