divided amongst my three youngest children before mentioned
and that at their mothers decease I further leave unto my daughter
Joseph a sum of money worth of one year old. Likewise I leave unto
my two grandsons William & David Brown sons to my daughter
Margaret Scott Battle as has been nominated as this is already
I likewise give unto my sons Andrew, David & James & my
daughter Hannah. Heir apparent Brown & Elizabeth wife to
John Scott to each of them the sum of five shillings
to be paid to each of them twelve months after my decease if
demanded & in default I do nominate & appoint my wife
above named with signs thereon & my son Joseph executor of this my
last will & testament, hereby revoking other wills by me heretofore
made. Ratifying & confirming this to be my last will & testament.
In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand & affixed my seal
this 4th day of August in the year 1773.

First I give & bequeath to funeral my dearly beloved wife her last & blothe £100. Third of all the movable property during her natural life & my dwelling house & all her chattels so to be the property of my son George & the remainder of all my real & personal property to be equally divided among my three sons to wit Richard, John & George, truly to my son Richard eleven five shillings sterling, & to my son James & his son John all my body clothes, all the property to be equally divided by the executors & trustees chosen by my executors — I do hereinafter constitute make & ordain to be my executors William Hill & James Barry to be the executors of this my first will & Testament, and I do hereby utterly disallow & make void all former wills & Testaments, written or printed, against & executors by me in anywise before named with & by me & them, Ratifying & confirming this the other to be my last will & Testament Witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand & seal this the 1st day of February in the year of our Lord 1795 —
