and all the appurtenances that belong to him that is now in partnership
between him & me with all I have against him of book debts
and my Great Coal Licenses —
I do will unto my son John Black a full score of Soots which
I formerly have worn, one horse & carriage buy of them you shall be
free of my cov^{ing} thirty Two pounds eight shillings to be paid
on Demand —
I do will unto my son in law Alexander Brown one red cow —
three years old, one mare of a year old black —
I do will unto Thomas Glening one Dollar —
I do will unto my son in law Abraham Miller the old still
and three pounds on demand —
I do will unto my nephew ~~William~~ ^{John} Brown one hundred and
thirty shillings which is a book debt —
I do will unto my nephew William Brown one two year
old Steer red with white spots —
I do will unto my nephew & niece William Black & Catharine
all the rest of my effects and them two be divided at the
discretion of my Executors —

And this I do hereby make to be my last will & Test. William
Black & John Allen Executors. Given under my hand in presence
of these witnesses present.

one Dollar also her bed & furniture and her saddle -

Item To my well beloved Daughter Sen I leave one Dollar & her cloaths,

Item To my well beloved daughter Jane Brown I leave one Dollar &
her cloaths & her bed & furniture and her saddle -

Item To my well beloved daughter Eleanor I leave one Dollar & her cloaths
and her bed & furniture & her saddle, - Item To my well beloved
daughter Mary Brown now Mary Maxwell I leave one Dollar

Item I leave to my youngest beloved daughter Catharine one Dollar &
her cloaths & her bed & furniture - Item To my well beloved
daughter Susanna I leave one Dollar & her cloaths -

Item To my well beloved son Richard I leave my plantation I now
live on only my wife to have her living out of it as above mentioned
also my wagon & gear to be put to his use also my Rifle gun -
Given under my hand & seal the 26th day of February 1769
