 & declare this my last will & testament, and I do appoint that my
 body be buried at the discretion of my friends with a decent Christian
 burial, I most command my soul to God that gave it being.
 In hope of a glorious resurrection with my body at the day of final
 Judgment & that next I will & expect that all my transgressions
 shall be ~~blot~~^{stricken}. And next I will & bequeath unto my loving
 wife Margaret Brown that she shall live during her life time on
 the part of my land given her now & that she enjoy all the benefit
 arising on & from the same as far as the dividing line of the same
 brought of John McDaniel. And also will & appoint that
 my said wife for the support of herself & my three young daughters
 Elizabeth, Mary & Sarah until they come of age, & affording
 her sufficient meat & drink, house hold, furniture of every kind
 with all necessary clothes, bedding, sheets, & Truck of every kind
 made in her hand, also with all my farming utensils & all others
 of every sort & kind, as the above named uses & benefits providing that
 she my said wife pay all my debts, except what I owe to John McDaniel
 above named. Two of my slaves one black & one white now with
 her spring half year old now as with her both which I will not
 bequeath to my living daughter Margaret Brown — That I will
 give to my son William Brown this land I lie on at his mother's
 death — Next I will & appoint that my son David Brown
 shall have one half part of my land I bought from John McDaniel
 upon conditions that he pay John McDaniel the one half of the
 debt I owe him as shall be due him on my land where
 by them paid. & also will & appoint my son William Brown in
 like manner paying the said John McDaniel one half the one part of the
 debt of the land now held by him & I also do appoint that my
 two sons David & William Brown may come to my son John Brown
 & spend each out of the value of their lands there given them \$10.
 and if either of them before my decease does & will appear & remain
 in my service for a year & a day I will & appoint that my

in case my said wife & I remain, and I will appoint that my
body be buried at the discretion of my wife with a decent Christian
burial, & that it be committed my soul to God that gave it being.
In hopes of a glorious resurrection with my body at the day of final
judgment & that now I will hope and trust all my family & others
will be saved. — And next I will & do give the care of my loving
wife Margaret Brown that she shall live during her life time on
this part of my land I now leave her. & that she enjoy all the benefit,
privilege or usage the same as far as the ordinary living of the said
I brought of John McDaniel. & Alexander H. Dods will I appoint that
my said wife pay the support of herself & my three young orough
lings Elizabeth, Mary & John until they come of age, & if so
will I appoint that out of my house hold furniture of every kind
with all my horses, cattle, sheep, hogs & stock of every kind the
Master in her hand, also with all my farming utensils & all others
of every sort & kind, for the above named uses & benefits providing that
the my said wife pay all my debts except what owe to John McDaniel
his widow, & two of my slaves one black & one white man with
her slaves, half & one black boy with her. Calf, wheat, & corn
belongeth to my son my daughter Margaret Brown — That I will
also my son William Brown his land I leave him at his mother's
death — & next I will I appoint that my son David Brown
shall have all that part of my land I brought from Scotland. & Canada
upon conditions that he pay John McDaniel the one half of the
Debt I now owe him as shall be due him on my lands where
by them paid. & also will I appoint my son William Brown in
like manner paying the said John McDaniel the other half of the
Master of the land now held by him & I do also I appoint that my
two sons David & William Brown pay unto my son John Brown
the sum of one hundred & ten dollars of the value of their lands I have given them. & the
sum of five dollars per acre my disease & infirm I will appoint & ordain
my executors to pay & discharge. My son John Brown having
of the money I will & do leave him, necessary I may have made
void to all debts & expenses all the while I was in life, & sufficient
to defray my funeral & other charges in any way otherwise as if they
had been incurred before my death or else.

In the name of GOD Amen. I Ephraim Brown of Charlotte County
in the State of N. Carolina, being of sound memory & judgment having the
full prospect of my Person, best being reduced to a dangerous degree
of bodily weakness, by disease & infirmity & apprehension that it may be
the pleasure of the divine Being to call me from this world by means
of my present illness, do for the convenience of my surviving friends
& for the purpose of better establishing the interest among his children
by remaining upon the earth longer & necessary to make my last
Will & Testament in manner & form following.

I direct that my body be decently & privately interred at the des-
ignation of my executors --

Item I direct that every perishable article of which I shall die before paid
such as House, Clock, Books &c be sold to the best advantage after my
funeral charges & other legal debts are paid & give direct the sum
all the residue of my Estate both real & personal unto my beloved
eldest son Charles Brown to him & his undivided heirs --

I also request I direct my executors either to sell or repair the
Buildings on the improved lot in Charlotte so as to render them ten-
anted as shall appear to them to be of most advantage to my sur-
viving children. It is better to enable them to make each repairs the
unimproved lot if found necessary, may be so. & the proceeds
of such sale in applying to the expenses --

The executors will continue the negroes in the present service or
have them out, as will best promote the interest of the infant.

I request that my executors would take especial care to have
my said Daughter decently, respectfully & judiciously educated, rather
in the family where she now lies, & not far off, only as the said
latter must for her orthodoxy & piety.
