In the name of God Amen. I William Deason do make & Ordain  
 this my last Will & Testament, being in perfect mind & memory  
 First I give my soul to God who gave it, Next I bequeath  
 unto my beloved wife Mary Deason one bed & its furniture &  
 my Sun Horse with a bald face & my bay mare while she is a  
 widow and if she should marry I allow her to give the bay mare  
 or her value to my Daughter Char. Thow, likewise I leave her the  
 choice of two cows. — Next I bequeath unto my beloved  
 Daughter Char. Thow as follows The belt that my bay mare is  
 with, if she has a belt, Likewise her bed & furniture & one kipe  
 named white lock and one Red Kiefer — Next I bequeath  
 unto my beloved son as follows my plantation & a wild land  
 belt that he claims with the tools that belong to the farm  
 The loom and Tacklings I allow to stay on the plantation  
 for the use of the family Likewise my shot gun I give to Thomas  
 Next I bequeath unto my beloved Daughter Margaret one cow  
 & half the cow named Gregory The remainder of the cows I leave  
 for the use of the family — Next I allow my son Thomas to give  
 my son Hugh one years boarding if he sees cause to call for it, in  
 case that I am call'd off without doing it myself. —  
 Next I leave to my son in law Elijah Harlin one dollar.  
 Next I leave to my son in law John Harlin one dollar.

 appoints his uncle Daniel Deherty Administrator of said will

Know all people that I John Denkins of the County of New Kent  
State of N. Carolina, being in a low state of bodily health  
but thro' the mercy of Gods, enjoying the use of my reasoning powers  
& knowing the mortality of mankind; Do make this my last will &  
Testament in form following Viz-

I lend to my beloved wife Polly Denkins during her natural life  
a widow had five negroes, Old George, big David, Molly & her child  
Virginia & big Jenny, my bay mare & riding chair, my bed and Cope  
board & one third of all my household & kitchen furniture & one  
third of all my Stock of Cattle, Hogs & Sheep & geese & all other kind  
of fowls, Also one third of the Crop whether growing or gathered in  
at the time of my death, Also one third of my farming utensils -  
also that tract of Land purchased of my son Joshua Denkins  
containing fifty three acres it being part of the tract of Land one  
which I am to be formerly laid for her proper use & benefit  
during the time above mentioned -

I give to my son James Denkins five negroes viz James which he now  
has in possession, Phillis & then three children viz Hercules, Cecily  
& Mary with their increase to him & his heirs forever -  
I give & bequeath to my son Frederick Denkins four negroes viz  
Nelson, Old Willy, his wife Milly & their daughter Jane, and all that  
tract of Land I now lie on with all its appurtenances to him  
and his heirs forever -

I give to my son Joshua Denkins two negroes viz Little Billy &  
Little George to him & his heirs forever -  
I give to my daughter Martha Kendrick two negroes viz Joe &  
his wife Selvy to her & her heirs forever -  
I give my daughter Mary Smith one negro man named George & then  
and all that tract of Land she now lies on, together with the tract  
of Land in the Indian Boundary between William Rice  
& the heirs of the whole
