I give and bequeath all my right and claim
to any pension which is due or may be due
and coming to me from The Government of the
United States for the service of my late
husband John Yarbrough in The Revolutionary
War and all the rest of my Estate to
Henry H. Yarbrough William Yarbrough
Mary & Elizabeth Yarbrough

I nominate and appoint Henry Yarbrough
my Executor to this my last will and Testament
This the first day of March 1854

Cornelius Hurley's Will

In the name of God Amen
I Cornelius Hurley of the County of Montgomery
& State of North Carolina being in body but of
perfect and sound mind and memory do make and
constitute this my last Will and Testament as
herein set forth.

First it is my desire that after my decease that
such or so much of my property that my family can
best do without shall be sold or so much thereof
as will satisfy all my just debts and after this
is done I give and bequeath to my beloved wife
Elizabeth Hurley all the lands and tenements that
belonging to me at that time also all and singular
the goods and chattels personal property of every
description household and kitchen furniture together
with every other article of property during her
natural life or widowhood

2^{dly} It is my desire that my father and mother to wit
Daniel Hurley and Mary Hurley shall remain
with my family and be supported by them so long
as they can agree and remain together satisfied

3^{dly} It is my desire after the decease or marriage of
my wife Elizabeth Hurley that my lands shall then
be equally divided between my three youngest sons
to wit Cornelius Hurley Daniel Hurley and Nathan
Hurley and that my two youngest daughters to wit
Barbara Elizabeth and Amanda Hurley shall receive
property in amount extra so as to be of equal value
to the amount I give to my other daughters at their
marriage

4^{thly} That what ever then may be remaining after
the above conditions is carried in good faith of
property or effect shall then be equally divided
between my youngest son, Cornelius Hurley
Daniel Hurley and Nathan Hurley
