

John S. Revell's will

State of North Carolina this the 10th day of
Montgomery County April 1st A.D. 1863
In the name of God Amen I beseech the Lord
I John S. Revell of the County and state aforesaid being
of perfect mind and memory do this day make
and publish this my last will and testament
in the manner following that is to say
In the first place sell off enough of my property
to satisfy all the just debts standing against me
and in the second place I give and bequeath unto
my loving wife Nancy Revell all the remanu-
rent of my estate to be in hand of her in the
following manner that is to say that she shall give
to each one of the girls an equal portion with those
that are now married and married as Sarah
Elizabeth is aforesaid I think it meet and right
to give her an extra gift and I hereby give Sarah
Elizabeth my husband and his heirs of land including
the home land and the buildings thereon to be hers
after the death of my wife - I mean the home tract
and the Rayle tract and another tract from Mr. T. Hayes
and further I direct after we are dead provide she this
without my heirs that said land shall then be equally
divided among all my heirs And further I direct that each
of my sons shall have a home given them of good
valuation, and after the death of my wife I direct that
all the lands belonging to me shall be equally divided among
all my heirs. I mean that the property given my wife shall
be hers during her natural life & widowhood and hereby appoint
my loving wife an executrix to this my last will and testament
and testimony whereof I have set my hand and seal the day
and year above mentioned in the year of our Lord - I S. Revell (sig)

I Joseph Russell of the County of Montgomery and
State of North Carolina being on low state of health
and weak in body but of perfect mind and memory Thanks
to God for the blessing do make and ordain this my
last will and testament in manner and form following
that is to say in the first place it is my will and desire
that my just debts be paid out of my estate then I give
and bequeath to my beloved wife Jane Russell all of
my earthly estate for her use for the support and comfort
of herself & my daughter Nancy S. Russell with the except-
ion of such articles as will be of no use to them and that
such articles as she will not need be sold and the money
arising from said sale be equally divided amongst all
my heirs my beloved wife sharing equally in this with
the rest of my heirs, that all the rest and residue of
my earthly estate including my lands to for the use and
support of my said beloved wife and daughter during
during the natural life of my beloved wife Jane Russell
and after her death my lands I give and bequeath to my
daughter Nancy S. Russell for her sole use and benefit
freely to have and to hold free of all and every other
claim right or title whatsoever and that all of my other
property (except land) that may remain after the death
of my said beloved wife be sold and the proceeds thereof
equally divided among all of my heirs including my
said daughter Nancy S. Russell

I Joseph Russell do declare this my last will and
testament and appoint my son William Russell and Nancy
Neeley of Stanly County my executors in this my last
will and testament - in witness whereof I have signed my
hand & seal the 21st day of February A.D. 1864
