 to Nov. 1858 with a credit of twenty one th dollars
 paid Sept 10th 1858 and I give and bequeath the
 surplus if any to Margaret Balaban Martin &
 McCulley & Christian Seidicker

I hereby nominate and appoint my son
 John C. McCulley my executor to this my last
 will and testament. Witness my hand and seal

 all of all kinds household and kitchen furniture
 and farming tools all of my corn groves and
 wheat now on hand and all of my food now
 on hand to have and to hold to her the said
 Elizabeth for and during the term of her natural
 life and to sell or dispose of as she thinks best
