Item 3. I give and bequeath to my daughter Nancy the sum of one hundred dollars as her right and property forever over and above the rest of my children at the death of my wife

And lastly I do hereby constitute and appoint Roland Chappel and Murdoch B McRae my lawful executors to all intents and purposes to execute this my last will and testament according to the true intent and meaning of the same and every part and clause thereof. hereby revoking and declaring utterly void all other wills and testaments.

In witness whereof I the said Joseph Blake do hereunto set my hand and seal this the 20th day of October AD 1848

Nancy Parsons' Will

I Nancy Parsons of the County of Montgomery A.C. being weak in body but of sound mind and memory and calling to mind the uncertainty of human life do make and publish this as my last will and testament with a view of settling my temporal affairs and disposing of the property I have in this world.

First I give and bequeath to my daughter Diana Braton out of my money on hand and due to me the sum of three hundred dollars to her and her heirs forever.

Secondly I will and bequeath to my daughter Palestine Parker the sum of one hundred and Twenty five dollars to her and her heirs forever.

Thirdly I will and bequeath unto my Grandson Montford Stokes Parsons the sum of Twenty five dollars to aid him in his education to him and his heirs forever.

Fourthly I give and bequeath unto my Grandson Seaborn Jones Parsons the sum of Twenty five dollars to aid also in his education to him and his heirs forever.

Fifthly I will and bequeath unto my son James Parsons and to each of my daughters Sarah Gallieith, Nancy Parker and Susan Meggison one dollar each to them and their heirs forever.

Sixthly I give and bequeath to the children or heirs of my deceased daughter Polly Parker one dollar to them and their heirs forever.

And it is hereby declared to be my further will and desire that the balance of my money and debt due me after paying the Doctor's bill out of the same and repairing and enclosing the graves in a proper manner shall be equally divided between my two daughters Diana

and State of North Carolina being of sound mind
and perfect memory do publish and declare this
to be my last will and testament.

My will is that Elizabeth Candler shall
have her bed bedstead and furniture, one cow
and calf and Seventy two dollars in money
to be lodged in the hands of the executors to
be let out by small instalments as she needs it.

My will is that the land on the east side
of Little River on which I live to go to the
heirs of Jacob Brunton deceased. The land in
the west side of Little River to be sold and
the profits equally divided between my

three sons, James Brunton, George Brunton and David
Brunton. money, household furniture notes and accou-
nts to be equally divided between my three sons
James, George, and David, and the heirs of my son
Jacob, deceased. All my stock, horses, mules, cows,
sheep, hogs, wagons, tools, and gear, wheels and
carriages all to be sold and equally
divided between my sons James, George, David
and the heirs of Jacob Brunton deceased. That
a committee of three men be appointed to divide
and value my negroes in four parcels as equally
as possible, then getting the most valuable
lots to pay over in money to those that get the
lowest lots, so that they be equally divided
between my sons James, George, David and the
heirs of Jacob Brunton deceased, also that
William Butler have Ten dollars in money.

It is my will that my sons George
Brunton and David Brunton be executors to this
my last will and testament, as witness my hand
and seal this the 5th day of March in the year
of our Lord 1806.
