And Quaintly being of sound mind and disposing memory, but considering the uncertainty of my earthly existence, do make and declare this my last will and testament in witness and form following, That is to say: I do hereby give and bequeath to my beloved wife Sarah all my personal property, goods, land, including of cows, cattle, hogs and sheep and all my household and kitchen furniture, &c. &c. which I have and to hold during her natural life and at her death to be equally divided among all my children except Malcom and Elizabeth which two have been advanced with such property.

I do hereby give and devise to my son Malcom a part of my land described as follows: Beginning on a stake in E. C. Martins line by a pine & history about four poles from the Old Corner then south 20. E. 10 poles to a pine on the mill road and beyond South 20. E. about 40 poles to a stake by two post-locks and white-ark painters near the head of a hollow on the old road then down the meadow of the hollow to a branch then across the various courses of the said branch to the old mill near the river then to and up the river with

its various courses through a walnut tree then a North west corner to a stake on the side of the road then to a river about two 1/2 miles longer then with this corner line N. 20. E. 10 poles to the corner red oak sapling on a pole with this other line 66. 11. 10. 3. poles to the said stake corner pine N. 20. E. 10 poles to a stake and three Spanish oaks farther N. 20. E. 10 poles to a bunch of maples on the bank of the river 20. 15. E. 7 poles crossing the river to a red oak stump about gum and several maple stumps. 20. 30. E. 2. poles to a post oak & post 10. 3. red oak & Spanish oak points to E. C. Martins corner then with the said stake line to the beginning.

I have and to hold to him the said Malcom his heirs and assigns forever.

I do hereby give and devise to my two sons John & Dayton all my lands on the East side of the river to be equally divided between them as they may agree on the division to have and to hold to each of them and their heirs forever.

I do hereby give and bequeath to my daughter Elizabeth who intermarried with John Reynolds the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars money to be paid by all the other heirs as soon as convenient. In witness whereof I the said Angus M. Millan do hereunto set my hand and seal on this the 11th day of May 1834.
