

Ann. Graham's Will

In the Name of God amen

I Ann Graham of the County of Moore and State of North Carolina being weak in body but of sound and perfect mind and memory blessed be almighty God for the same, do make and publish this my last will and Testament in manner and form following, that is to say, first I give and bequeath to my beloved son Dugald Graham Fort Acres of land on which my dwelling and other houses stand and it is my Will and wish that my beloved daughter Nancy Graham have the benefit of said forty acres of land with the improvements thereon as long as she may live with her said brother Dugald

Secondly I give and bequeath to my son Dugald Graham all my interests in the remaining tracts or parcels of land belonging to and connected with the homestead of Forty Acres as above described

Thirdly I give and bequeath my Negro Girl Hanny Equally to my son Dugald and my Daughter Nancy Graham

Fourthly I give and bequeath to my Grand Daughter Mary Gillis Twenty two dollars in money Fifthly I give and bequeath my interest in the stock of Cotton and sheep equally between my son Dugald & Daughter Nancy Graham

Sixthly I give and bequeath to my son Arch Graham Twenty five dollars. Seventhly I give and bequeath to my daughter Sarah Cameron one hundred dollars in her own right to use as she may think proper. and lastly I leave my interest in the house furniture to be divided equally

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between Dugald, Nancy, Mary Gillis and her daughter Mary Gillis also a rifle gun, my sword &c. and old pig to my son Dugald Graham whom I hereby appoint Sole Executor of this my last will and Testament In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal the 29 day of March 1835
