North Carolina Moore County - The last will and testament of Allen Martin
Made in his own dwelling house in the last stage. In the Name of God Amen
I & Myself doth of sound mind and memory on the fourth of July 1816 do
this day publish this my last will and testament in manner following that
is to say - I give and bequeath to my beloved wife Margaret the whole of
my Estate during her life and - 3. to my son John Martin now in the united
States giving him out of the Estate Twenty Dollars worth -
3. also I desire my son Daniel Martin to marriage and leave the rest of the
children with his mother during life and at her death the whole of my Estate
to be equally divided among his children and - The said Allen Martin doth leave to
his my last will and testament set my hand and seal the day and year first
above written signed sealed published and declared in the presence of us

Charles MacConnons Will

This 7th day of May in the year of our Lord 1816
I doth will my property as following; That one half of the Land
shall be given to my brother or other children if either of them should
choose to come to this country, and the other half my wife shall
have it and after her death her legatee shall have it she has a lifetime
of the whole of it but in case she dies before her heirs may take
their own half of the land but if she lives single life $\frac{1}{4}$ th part of the
land shall be given to her heirs - Any other
property there is on the plantation after my wife is past she is to have it.
There is a balance due me by Horner and MacConnon for three notes that I gave
him, the same balance I do allow Edward Mac Connal to have it
I present Edward Mac Connal to the court in Richmond County November

David Wicker's Will

In the Name of God Amen I David Wicker of Moore County
being in perfect health and of perfect mind and memory thankes be given
to God almighty and the immortality of my body and knowing
that it is appointed for all men once to die do make and ordaine this my
last will and testament that is to say that as touching such worldly
estate wherewithal I have pleased God to bless me in this life
I give and devise and dispose of the same in the following manner
and form - First - I give to my well beloved wife Susannah the half of
lands & effects during her lifetime and after her decease to my youngest
son John and then also to have the rest of the lands during her life and
then to turn to my sons Peter and John and their heirs forever.
I bequeath the blacksmith tools to my son Peter as his lawfull
property

My will is made and executed
in the presence of me and two others
as witnesses and attested this 29th day of June 1816

as his lawfull property. I bequeath also to two children to my beloved wife during her
life time and after her decease to my son Peter and Peter son Wicker -

Secondly - I give to my son Peter all the upper part of the Land and the lower part
to my youngest son John Wicker to be Equally divided between them and by them
fully to be possessed and enjoyed. also I bequeath to my Eldest son Pleasant Wicker one
hundred Dollars to be paid after my decease in my Executors to William Johnson my son in
law a negro woman called Dolly and to Alexander Johnson a negro fellow called Charles and
to Peter Wicker my son a negro man called Frank. Also to John Wicker a negro woman
called Annah and her increase to my son in law Donald Mc Gee a negro boy called
John and I constitute make and ordain John Wicker and Peter Wicker my sons jointly
the sole Executors of this my last Will and Testament and to them jointly utterly devolve
to them and descendants all and every other former bequest and
Executor by me in any wise before made valid & binding and confirming
this and no other to be my last Will and Testament in witness whereof I have hereunto
set my hand and seal this 26th day of December in the year of our Lord one thousand
Eight Hundred and Seven - Signed Sealed published pronounced and declared by this
said David Wicker as his last will and testament in the presence of us who
are in the present and in the presence of each other have hereunto subscribed our

John Kinney's Will

September 12 1816. In the Name of God Amen. I John Kinney of the County of Moore and State of
North Carolina being weak in body but of perfect mind and memory thankes be to god for it and
knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die do make and ordaine this my last will and
testament that is to say principally and first of all do command my soul to God who gave
it, and my body to burial with decent Christian burial at the descretion of my Executor
nothing doubting but I shall receive the same again by the mighty power of God who gave it
and lastly I do hereby make and declare unto all worldy estate wherewithal I have beene blessed
in this life, I do desire and desirous of the same in the following manner and form 1816. First falls
to give to my daughter Sally fifty pounds current money of this State with what shall already
be given her which money is to be record out of my estate that is unsold or given to Clark
Wadsworth twenty five pounds at the age of eighteen - Give and bequeath to
Sons James and Sally Collier Ten pounds each, as soon as they are of age - I desire
my Executors to sell all my lands that is unsold after my death as they think proper either
at publick or private sale, and all the remainder of my estate to be divided between
James Kinney and Clark Wadsworth, and after Sons James Kinney's death Clark Wadsworth
and his heirs is to have his part - Likewise I do make and ordaine this my last will and testament and do
hereby testifye disallow twelve and desirous of the same in the following manner and form 1816. I do desire
and bequeath to my executors by me in any ways before made settled and agreed with them testifyinge
and confirming this and no other to be my last will and testament in witness whereof I have
signed sealed published and attested by the said John Kinney as his last will and testament
in presence of the subscribers
