

Still M. Keithen Will continued

and in addition to what I have heretofore given the heirs of Will M. Keithen I now bequeath to them as follows to Sarah M. Keithen widow Anne M. R. M. Keithen. Louisa, Catharine, Margaret, and Mary Lane forty Dollars to each one of them and to Will M. Keithen's two sons Archibald and Daniel Bunder sixty Dollars to each one of them. I also bequeath to John Blue and Catharine his wife and his three Daughters Louisa M. B. and Lydia the sum of ten Dollars to each one of them and also to Will M. R. Blue the sum twenty Dollars I also bequeath to Daniel M. Millen the sum of thirty Dollars to Archibald M. Millen Daniel son the sum of twenty Dollars to Anne M. Millen Daniel Daughter the sum of ten Dollars I also bequeath the ten Dollars to aid the support of the Gospel.

I have given to my son Daniel M. Keithen one negro man named Charles the plantation on which he now lives and the place on the road one mare bottle and sheep one copper still and in addition to what has been heretofore given I now bequeath to him the sum of three hundred Dollars I also bequeath to my Daughter Mary M. Millen a negro woman named Alsey Flora and her child slaves on the mouth of the said Flora and her child in money I also bequeath to my grand child Mary Eliza M. Millen a negro girl named Louisa the above mentioned Alsey Flora and her child after the death of my Daughter Mary M. Millen they or their value are to be equally divided between Will M. Millen, Archibald M. Millen and Sarah M. Millen these sum which I have bequeathed to these several different persons they are to receive of the Debt due and can be collected to that amount and if not

collected to that amount each one to have in proportion to the sums that they were to receive and if there will be any over and above what will give back one the sums mentioned that over to be divided between my son Daniel M. Keithen and John Blue so I conclude this to be my last will and testament after appointing Daniel M. Keithen to be my executor.

above hundred acres with Patrick the other hundred acres call the new hundred I will that to be sold at publick sale to the highest Bidder I will to my son James Lashley twenty Dollars to be collected out of the money arising from my sale I also give and be will to my Daughter Susan Love twenty Dollars to be made and paid in like manner and the residue from my estate to be equally divided between my two Daughters Lucy and Dilley and my Daughter Esabella Revells I give and be will to my Patrick Lashley my Black Smiths tools and my small box to I also will to my Daughter Lucy Lashley my wagon and my Bay Mare I do will to my son Daughter Esabel Revells my feather bed and furniture I do give and be will to my Daughter Dilley two white cows also to my Daughter Lucy one black cow and to my son Patrick Lashley one read brown I give and be will to my Daughter Sally Ferguson fifty cents in silver I also give and be will to my Mary Robinson fifty cents in silver My kitchen furniture I give to my Daughter Lucy and to draw to a close my affairs by appointing my friend Abel Kelly Executor to settle this my Last will and Testament I witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this March the 23rd A.D. 1835

John Baker's will

In the name of God amen August the twenty second Day A.D. 1836 I John Baker Son of the County of Moore and State of North Carolina being sick in body but of perfect mind and memory thanks be to Almighty God calling to mind the mortality of my body and knowing that all must yield to death when it shall please God to call them—do make, constitute, ordain and declare this to be my last will and testament in manner and form following Revoking and annulling by these presents all and every other will or testament heretofore by me made and this to be my last will and testament and no other In the first place principally and first of all I recommend my soul to the hands of Almighty God who gave it and my body I recommend to the earth to be buried in a Christian like Burial at the Discretion of my executors hereafter named nothing doubting but of the General Resurrection I shall receive the same by the mighty power of God And as touching such worldly Estate as it has pleased God to bless me with in this life I give, Devise and dispose of in the manner and form as follows.— in the first place My Desire is that all my just Debts may be punctually paid— Then I Give and bequeath to my beloved son John Baker one negro boy named John to him and his heirs forever— Then I Give and bequeath to my beloved son Archibald Baker three negroes named Nimmy Rhodia and Pasley and half of my stock of Hogs to him and his heirs forever— Then I Give and bequeath to my beloved Daughter Jimmy Campbell one negro boy named Henry to be lived out by my Executors until the said Dorsey's Death and the money arising for said
