I Solomon Parker of Nash County and State of North Carolina being of sound and perfect mind and memory thanks be to God for the same calling to mind the mortality of my body and knowing that it is my last will and testament first I give my soul to God who gave it and my body to the earth to be buried in a christian like manner at the discretion of my executors as touching my worldly goods that it hath pleased God to bless me with I dispose of them in manner following Item: I give and bequeath to my son Calvin Parker one hundred acres of land adjoining his own land and the Hamon man tract on the swamp also two negroes one by the name of amos one by the name of milly also one feather bed and furniture. I give it to him and his heirs forever Item: I give and bequeath to my son Offe Parker two hundred and fifty acres of woodling land adjoining Jesse Barnes also one hundred acres adjoining the same place two negroes one by the name of Jack and one by the name of *Lue* also one bed and furniture I give it to him and his heirs forever. Item: I give and bequeath to my son Weeks Parker two hundred and thirty nine acres of land none by Earsenocy place and the baldey place I also give him two negroes one by the name of David and one by the name of Leese also one feather bed and furniture, also one mare, bridle and saddle. I give it to him and his heirs forever. Item: I give and bequeath to my son Solomon Parker two hundred acres of land none by the name of the Vanuse place also Give him two negroes one by the name of Ruffin and one by the name of Mary I give it to him and his heirs forever Item: I give and bequeath to my daughter Polly Ures two negroes one by the name of Little Henry and one by the name of Jude I also give my gray horse and money enough to by her a saddle I give it to her and her heirs forever. Item: I give and bequeath to my daughter Kizzey Ures one negro by the name of Critta I also give her five hundred dollars to be raised out of my property I give it to her and her heirs forever. Item: I leave Elster and her child panner to be sold and the monies arising from the sale of them to be equally divided between my three grand children Beckey, Joe, Dempsy, I also give my daughter Kizzey Ures my black Mare I give it to her and her heirs forever. I also leave all the remainder part of my estate to be sold and my just debts paid and I give my two daughters one hundred dollars each of them and the overplus to be equally divided between my four

sons Solomon, Calvin and Offe and Weeks, and I hereby make and ordain my son Calvin Parker and Alford Ures my son-in-law my sole and sole executors to this my last will and testament in witness whereof I the said Solomon B. I Nathan Joiner of the county of Nash and State of North Carolina being in a low state of health but of perfect mind and memory calling to mind the mortality of the body and knowing that it is appointed for all men to die do this fourth day of August in the one year of our lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty six make public and declare this my last will and testament in manner and form following to wit first I lend to my beloved wife Annie Joiner all my land where I now live all my stock of every kind all the rest of my estate, and after her death Item: I give my land to my daughter Juda Joiner and all my stock of every kind and all the rest of my estate if my daughter Juda should die with out an heir lawfully begotten of her body then the same to return back to my son David Joiner and all the rest of my estate to be equally divided between my two sons Thomas and David Joiner.

Item: I give to my two sons five dollars each to be paid in money by my executors. I do hereby appoint my Brother Nathan Joiner executors to this my last will and testament in witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and affixed my seal the day and date above written.
