Item: I give and bequeath to my daughter Elizabeth one hundred dollars to be raised out of my estate.

Item: I give and bequeath to my daughter Aby one negro girl called Fan andone called Finah, also three cows and calves and ne bed.

Item: I give and bequeath to my son Benjamin one negro boy called Guy to have said negro his life and after my son Bens death to return to my grandson Willibough Manning or hisheirs.

Item: My will is that if wright John wright Manning, Willebough Lane Manning sons should eighted, of them die before he is of age or has an heir that in that case the whole of the property to go to the other if both should die before the are of age or have heirs then the property to be equally divided between all my children.

Item: All the rest and residue of my estate not already given away to be sold and after the payment of debts andlegacies to be equally divided between my children.

Item: I constitute and appoint Charles Hammen and George Boddie Exr.
