I Daniel Dumbibin of New Hanover County, Tarmer, being sick and weak in body, but of sound and disposing mind, memory and understanding, do make, publish and declare this to be and contain my last Will and Testament as follows, to wit, First. I recommend my soul to God who gave it, and my body I desire may be decently buried by my Executor hereinafter named. I will, order, and direct, that all my just debts and funeral expences, be paid by my Executor, after named. I give, devise and bequeath unto my loving wife Ruth, my plantation, houses, tangrad, with my three negroes Lora, Robin and Bener, with the sum of eighty pounds proc. money, which is in the hands of my Mother in law, during her life; but if my wife should marry, I give and bequeath to my loving mother Hannah Dumbibin, my negro man named Robin. And in case my wife should die without issue of our bodies, then I give devise and bequeath unto my said loving mother, Hannah Dumbibin and to my loving brother, Jonathan Dumbibin all my estate real and personal whatsoever, and whosoever and to their heirs and assigns forever. I give unto my loving brother, Jonathan Dumbibin all my wearing apparel, gun, cutlery, gold buttons, silver shoe and blue buckles. And in case my wife should die without issue of our bodies, and also my mother and brother, Jonathan, then and in that case I give, devise and bequeath all my estate real and personal to my loving sister, Jane Ward: children to be equally divided between them share and share alike, and to their heirs and assigns forever, and I do hereby nominate, constitute and appoint my brother and law, Anthony Ward sole executor, of this my last Will and Testament, hereby revoking and declaring void, null and of no effect, all former and other wills by him at any time heretofore made and declaring this only to be and contain my last Will

and Testament. In Witness whereof I the said Daniel Dumbibin have hereunto set my hand and seal this eighth day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and six

It is my will, that my dearly beloved wife Mary Devane enjoy the use of all my estate during her widowhood, except at Long Creek, which I give to my well beloved son John Devane.
