

In the name of God Amen. Elizabeth Brown of
Wilmington in the State of North Carolina, do make this my
Will and Testament, as follows.

Imprimis. I desire that my body may be buried in a decent
manner as my Executors may direct.

Item. I give and bequeath to my son William Bunton all my
houses and lots in the town of Wilmington or elsewhere, to
him and his heirs forever; also as much of my household
furniture as he may choose, the remainder to be sold by my law-
ful

Item. I give and bequeath to my daughter, Rachel de Lona the
wife of Daniel de Lona, three hundred pounds, to be paid
to her as soon as my Executors can conveniently do it, but
in no wise subject to the control of her present husband, or
to the control of any future husband she may have.

Item. I give and bequeath to my grand daughter Ann Gordon
the daughter of the late John Gordon, three hundred pounds
to be paid to the said Ann Gordon as she may want it for
her education, at the discretion of my executors.

Item. All the residue of my property, whether real, personal
or mixed, I give and bequeath to my son William Bunton
and I hereby revoke and disannul all other, Will or Wills
by me heretofore made.

Lastly. I hereby nominate, constitute and appoint my friends
Archibald McClaine and Thomas McClaine to be Executors
of this my last Will and Testament.

I, Robert Bloodworth of New Hanover County and State aforesaid, being weak, in body, but of sound mind, memory and Judgment (God be praised), therefore calling to mind the mortality of my body, and knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die, do make and ordain this my last Will and Testament in manner, and form following, that is to say,

I give and bequeath to my beloved wife Rebecca Bloodworth, my negroes Boston, Hannah, Sam, Blamden, and Lema; likewise all the household furniture and stock, of all sorts, that I may die possessed of; also the utensils of my household.

I give and bequeath to my beloved children all the remaining part of my estate both real and personal to be divided equally amongst them as they become of age, their heirs and assigns forever.

I do hereby constitute and appoint my beloved wife Executrix and my friends William Jones, Timothy Bloodworth, David Jones Jr, and Hugh Lamphard my Executors, to carry this my last Will into execution, and I do hereby empower, them to make titles in my behalf for all lands sold by me, signed and acknowledged this 2nd day of July, 1789.
