

In the name of God. Amen.

I Elizabeth Butlar, of the town of Wilmington, in the State of North Carolina, being of sound and perfect mind and memory, do make and publish this to be my last Will and Testament, hereby revoking all other Wills by me at any time heretofore made. First. I desire that anybody may be interested in a becoming manner, and the expenses thereof defrayed by my Executor, with the first money of my estate, that may come into his hands.

Secondly. I give and bequeath my negro slave Lucy to my beloved nephew Frederick Butlar, his executors, administrators and assigns forever.

Thirdly. Whereas by the last Will of my deceased sister Lucy Butlar, certain property is devised and bequeathed after my death to my nephew Frederick Butlar, and my niece Jane L. Fleming, and Euphemia Butlar, in equal shares, subject however, to such modification and alteration of their shares or proportions as by my last Will in writing should direct. Now therefore by virtue and in pursuance of said power, in me vested, and for the reason that my said niece Euphemia is since dead, I do hereby direct, declare and appoint that the said property shall be divided into three equal parts, two of which parts shall be and remain for the use of my nephew Frederick Butlar, and the other, to the use of my niece Jane L. Fleming; and all to be held by the Trustees named in the Will of my said sister, to and for the trusts and purposes, and with and under the powers, provisions and limitations in said Will declared, and more other.

Lastly. I appoint my friend George Davis to be Executor of this my last Will.

In Witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand this 19th day of January, A.D. 1850.
Signed, published and sealed by the testatrix, to her last Will and Testament, in the presence of us, who in her presence and at her request, have subscribed the same as witnesses.
