In the name of God. Ameed. I, John Batt of the
County of New Hanover, State of North Carolina, being sick in
body, but of perfect mind and memory, thanks be given unto God
for it, calling to mind the mortality of my body, and knowing
that it is of once appointed for all men once to die; do make and
ordain this my last will and Testament, that is to say, principally and
First of all, I give and recommit my soul unto God that gave
it; and my body to be buried in a Christian like manner, at the
discretion of my executors, nothing doubting but that I shall receive
the same again by the mighty power of God, and as touching my
worldly estate wherewithal it has pleased God to bless me with
in this life, I give, devise and despose of the following manner
and form.

First. I give and bequeath to Sarah my dearely beloved wife, or
negroe wench Dolly, one bed and furniture, also six cows & scalps
during her widowhood. I also give and bequeath unto my dear
beloved wife Sarah, one mare Lilly, together with all the house
hogs; also the plantation whereon I now live during her widowhood
also all my corn and meat that I now have; then at her death
or marriage to be sold and equally divided amongst my children
then alive.

Also I give to my well beloved daughter, Sarah Batt, one mulatto
girl Molly, also one bed and furniture, to her and her heirs forever.
Also I give unto my well beloved daughter, Mary Batt one negroe boy
Booker, also one bed and furniture, to her, and her, heirs forever,
Also I give and bequeath unto my well beloved son John Batt all
and singular my lands and tenements, also two negroes by the
name of Cleancy and Gabriel, also one horse colt by the name
Anthony, to him and his heirs forever.

Also I give and bequeath unto my well beloved daughter, Zella
Batt, one mulatto boy David, also one hundred Spanish
dollars, to her, and her, heirs forever, by them to be proportioned
And I do hereby utterly disallow, revoke, and disannul all and
every other former, testaments, wills, legacies, bequeaths, & consecutions

likewised constitute, make and ordain Sarah my beloved wife
and a Stockley Sidbury my executors to this my last will and
testament.

It is my will that all the remaining part of my property not men-
tioned in this will, shall be sold and equally divided amongst
my children. Ratifying and confirming this and no other, to be
my last will and testament. In witness whereof I have hereunto
set my hand and seal this 18th of January 1803.
