In the name of God Amen. I, John Benson of New  
Hanover County, being sick and weak of body, but of perfect mind  
and memory, thanks be to God, therefore calling to mind the mortality  
of my body, and that it is appointed for all men to die; do  
make and ordain this to be my last Will and Testament  
that is to say;

Principally and first of all, I give and recommend my soul  
into the hands of God that gave it, and my body I commit  
to the earth to be buried in a decent and Christian like manner  
at the discretion of my Executors hereafter named, nothing  
doubting but at the general resurrection I shall receive  
the same again by the mighty power of God. And as touching  
such worldly estate where with it hath pleased God to blesse me  
with in this life, I give, devise and dispose of in manner  
and form following.

In primis.

Item. I give unto my wife Ede Benson one third part of all  
my personal estate.

Item. I give unto my son James, the plantation whereon I  
now live, to be his immediately after his mothers decease.

Item. I will that the rest and residue of my estate be equally  
divided amongst my three children, vizt, James, Mary and  
Elizabeth.

And I hereby constitute and appoint Francis Roads and  
John Potter, to be Executors to this my last Will and Testament,  
and I do hereby disannul and revoke all other Wills and Test-  
aments before this time by me made, ratifying and confir-  
ming this and no other, to be my last Will and Testament.  
In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this

fourteenth day of February 1744.
