In witness I give and bequeath to my two sisters, Sarah and Ann Bray of the City of Limerick, in Ireland, all my whole estate both real and personal, money &c: to be equally divided between them after my just debts are paid  
Lastly. I do hereby nominate and appoint Mr John Herges of the State and County aforesaid, Surgeon, to be my only true and lawful Lawyer with full power, to demand and recover all debts due to me, to take into possession all monies &c being my property, and to execute this my last Will.

In the name of God received. I Edmund Cobbin, New Hanover County, in the State of North Carolina, being in sound mind and memory, do make, constitute and appoint this to be my last Will and Testament, hereby revoking all other Wills and Testaments by me heretofore made -

I give, devise and bequeath unto Lewis Le Grand a mulatto boy (the son of a negro woman called Nelly) whom I purchased of Mr. Frederick Jones Jr. (he having purchased from Sarah Moore widow of the late Mr. George Moore) his freedom forever, and I desire my executors will have the same ratified by the County Court -

I give, devise and bequeath unto the said Lewis Le Grand a negro woman called Heney, together with her children Nancy, Iris, Billy and Tom; also I give unto the said Lewis Le Grand a negro boy called Henry, and a negro girl called Rose, together with all the future increase of the above mentioned negroes, to have and to hold the same forever. I desire and request my executors will hire out all the above negroes except any two of them that Nelly may choose to be with her, and the money arising therefrom to be applied to the use of the said Nelly, and Lewis Le Grand, and the child the said Nelly is now big with -

I give, devise and bequeath unto the said Nelly, my horse named, six cows, one bed, bolster, and pillows, all my blankets, sheets and all my bed furniture, and as much of my kitchen furniture as she wants, and what China I may have, all my clothes and buttons -

I give, devise and bequeath unto Capt. Thomas Allen three negroes, viz., Barnesby, Dolly and her child Henry, and I request and desire he will purchase the child that Nelly is now big with from Mr. George Moore and have it made free. This I expect and make no doubt he will comply with, as I know his sincerity and friendship for me, and as they will be sufficient to pay him for the price of the child -

I give, devise and bequeath unto Mr. Frederick Jones Jr. my plantation whereon I live, and a piece of land (adjoining the said plantation) which I took up, for and in consideration of the
