I, Jonathan Dumbrell of the town of Wilmington in the County of New Hanover, Merchant, being at this time of a sound disposing mind and memory, and considering the uncertainty of this mortal life, now hereunto moving, do make and ordain this to be and contain my last Will and Testament, in manner and form following: First I commend my soul into the hands of Almighty God, w^e all hope of future happiness; it is my express will and desire, that all my just debts be paid with honor,

Item. I give, devise and bequeath to my loving mother Hannah Dumbrell, my house and lot in Market Street with the wharf; also my plantation called Friends Retreat, now or ever

by George McCullough, with all the houses, gardens, tenements
accepting the reserved hereafter mentioned) Also all my household
furniture of whatsoever kind or nature whatsoever, and my slaves
Jacky, Lou, Robin and Sarah, and five hundred pounds currency
of this state, to come out of my stock in trade; to have and to hold
to the proper use and behoof of my said mother, for and during
her natural life; and at her decease the same and every part
thereof to go as hereafter, bequeathed —

Item. I give, devise and bequeath to my loving sister Jane Ward
widow of Anthony Ward deceased, all my right and title to my
Marlborough plantations and ten acres of land joining Doctor
Seixas on Marlborough, being part of thirty acres I purchased of
Samuel Green, also my three largest salt pens, and my yokes
oxen, to her and her heirs and assigns forever —

Item. It is my will and desire that there be collected as soon
as possible out of my debts and stock in trade, the sum of two
thousand pounds, which I give and bequeath to my sister, Jane
Ward, her children named Frederick, and Anthony Ward and
Hannah, Jane and Catharine Ward; also all my household furni-
ture after the decease of my mother, to be equally divided among
them share and share alike, to them and their heirs forever. It is
my will and desire, that if either of the before mentioned children
should die before they arrived to age or marry, in that case what-
ever is allotted them to go to the survivors of them share and share
alike —

Item. I give, devise and bequeath to Catharine Hoff, Nicholas
Hoff and Bargum Hoff, all my stock of cattle, that ranges at the
sound, to be equally divided among them share and share
alike, to them and their heirs forever —

Item. I give, devise and bequeath to Alice Hostler, Henry Young,
and John DuBois, in trust for Mary Ann Gough, during her
natural life, my plantation called Mill Grove, with the
houses, gardens &c, with my negro man Glasgow, and six
cows with whatever calves they may bear at her decease, first
giving my mother, choice of two cows out of my stock; and at
the decease of the said Mary Ann Gough, the plantation &c to
go as hereafter bequeathed —

Item. I give, devise and bequeath to Mary Ann Gough, these
all pens, and five hundred pounds currency of this state, to be
paid her, as soon as possible after my decease out of my stock of
hogs at New River, and all my stock of hogs to her and her
heirs forever — It is my particular will and desire that Mary Ann
Gough do have free liberty to cut fire wood and felling timber
on off the Friends Retreat land, without hindrance or molesta-
tion, during her natural life, and to have a full ingress, egress and

Item. I give, devise and bequeath to Alexr Hostley, Henry Young
and John DuBois, in trust for John son of Mary Ann Gough about
about the age of five years and eight months old, my house and
lot in Market Street that I lived in (excepting the Bake house)
and my slaves Lou and Robin, after the decease of my mother
to him, his heirs and assigns forever,

Item. I give, devise and bequeath to Alexr Hostley, Henry Young,
and John DuBois, in trust for Dennis Blatham son of Mary Ann
Gough, about three years five months old; after the decease of my
mother, my bakehouse and the ground on which it stands, also
the Washouse and wharf joining that part left his brother John
and my negroes Jacob and Sarah, and her increased, to him and
his heirs forever,

Item. I give, devise and bequeath to Alexr Hostley, Henry Young
and John DuBois, in trust for Charlotte, daughter of Mary Ann
Gough, about the age of eight years and two months old (after the
decease of my mother) my plantation called Friends Retreat,
and one thousand pounds current money of this State, to be paid
to interest as soon as it can be paid by my Executors after my
decease; to her, and her heirs forever,

Item. I give, devise and bequeath to Alexr Hostley, Henry Young
and John DuBois, in trust for Charlotte, daughter of Mary Ann
Gough, after the decease of her mother, my plantation called
Hill Grove, and my negro man Glasgow, and six cows and
their increased, to her and her heirs forever,

It is my will and desire, that if either of the children of Mary Ann
Gough, should die before they arrive at age or marry, in that
case I leave whatever has been bequeathed to them, to the survivor
of their share and share alike, to them and their heirs forever,

Item. I give, devise and bequeath to my loving mother Hannah
Dunbien, my wearing apparel of whatsoever kind at her own
disposal, to her own property and behoof forever,

Lastly. It is my will and desire that my horses, slaves, cattle and
sheep, and all other of my estate real and personal whatsoever,
and wheresoever it may be found not herein bequeathed, be sold
by my Executors to the best advantage, and whatever money it
in trade be drawn out and such of my debt be collected as my
Executors think proper, in order to pay my debts and legacies
as herein bequeathed. It is my express will and desire, should there
not be enough to pay the legacies left in money, I desire it may
be distributed as nearly as possible, and in proportion to the
real sum herein bequeathed, and should there be any surplus
money, more than will pay my debts and legacies, I desire it may
go towards the maintenance of the children of Mary Ann Gough
before mentioned,

I do hereby nominate and appoint my loving mother
Hannah Dubbibin Executrix and Alexey Hostler, Henry Young
and John DeBois Executors of this my last Will and Testament
hereby revoking and making null and void all former Wills
and Testaments by me heretofore made. In witness whereof I have

In the name of good Anne Lewis Henry DeKopet of New Hanover County, being in good health and perfect memory (blessed be God for the same) do the twenty first day of April in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and seventy nine, make and publish this my last Will and Testament, in manner and form following, to wit, I recommend my soul into the hands of Almighty God who gave it to me, and my body to the earth from whence it came, in hopes of a joyfull resurrection from the dead, through the merits of my Saviour Jesus Christ; and as for that worldly estate wherewithal it hath pleased God to bless me, I dispose thereof as follows.

First I will that all my just debts and funeral charges be paid as soon as possible.

Item. I give and bequeath unto my loving wife Margaret DeKopet, all my household goods, rings and furniture (except the family pictures,) to be disposed of by her as she thinks proper,

Item. I will that my loving wife Margaret DeKopet have the use of all my plate and family pictures during her natural life and at her decease I give and bequeath unto my nephew John DeKopet, the family pictures, and in case of his death before he attains the age of twenty one years, I give and bequeath the same unto my niece Magdalene Margaret Walker, wife of James Walker, and at the decease of my said wife I give and bequeath unto James Walker, all the plate given unto by Mrs. Elizabeth Catharine DeKopet; and the remainder of my plate, my wife may dispose of as she thinks proper,

Item. I give and bequeath unto my loving wife Margaret DeKopet during her natural life, the use and labour of all my slaves the interest of money due to me, the use and benefit of all my horses, cattle, sheep and hogs, and the whole profit of my estate real and personal of every kind. And at her death I give and bequeath my whole estate real and personal in the following manner:
