

The last Will and Testament of Magdalene
Margaret Walker of Wilmington N^o. Va., made
this fourteenth day of January in the year 1826,

Being this day in sound mind and memory I do hereby publish
and declare this my last Will and Testament.

I give and bequeath to my son James M Walker, my negroe woman
Rebecca, and her grand daughter, Maria, also my silver fasten.

To my son Julius H Walker, I give and bequeath my negroe woman
Polly and her son William, on condition, that he pay their value, to
be ascertained by two indifferent persons, at my death, to my daughter
Louisa M Swift, in five annual instalments, without interest.
I also give to the said Julius, my negroe woman Peggy, and her grand
daughter, Margaret, provided he pay to my grand daughter
Charlotte Osbourne, four years after my death, the value of said Margaret
at my death, without interest, to be ascertained by two indifferent
persons.

The lot belonging to me, situated on the North side of
Dock Street, between Front and Second streets, in the town of Wilmington
N^o. Va., I give and bequeath to my son Julius; also one half of
whatever interests may appertain to me under a claim to lands
in the Minisink Patent, State of New York, devised to me from my
grandfather, John Du Bois, or my brother, John Du Bois, or in other
way; half of the remaining moiety I give to the children of my
daughter, Louisa M Swift; the other half to the unmarried
children of my deceased daughter, Harriet Osbourne.

My negroe girl Sarah Ann, Polly's daughter, I give the gift
to my grand daughter, Mary Ann Walker.

To my grandson Charles Bruce Walker, I give my negroe
boy Daniel, Polly's son.

And to my grand daughter, Emma Smith Walker, my negroe
girl Elizabeth, daughter of the same Polly.

The bed, bolster, pillows and curtains, and bedstead, now
in use in my chamber, I give to my grand daughter, Magdalene
Julia Osbourne.

And my old wither pot and silver salt cellar to my grand
daughter, Harriet Swift, also the work table, basin, stand, and
Pazy chair at present in my chamber.

The bureau to my grand daughter, Julia.

My table spoons, tea spoons, silver waiters, silver butter
boats, and whatever other plate or property real or personal
which I may die possessed, I give and bequeath to my son Julius
H Walker, upon condition that he give to each of my daughters
Julia and Charlotte Osbourne, when they become of age, or are
married, six table spoons and six tea spoons.

I hereby constitute and appoint my son Julius H. Walker, executor, of this my last will and Testament, particularly obliging him before the payment of any of the aforesaid legacies to liquidate and settle all just demands there might be against me or my estate.

As an exception to the above residuary clause, I give and bequeath to my grand daughter, Harriet Moore, my mulatto girl Abby; and to my grand daughter, Julia Ashme, my mulatto girl Polly.

In testimony whereof I hereunto affix my hand and seal this fourteenth day of January, in the year, one thousand eight hundred and twenty six, at the Barn, near Wilmington N.C. substituting Swift for Moore in the sixteenth line of the second page, as far only as relate to the Mill, Pot & Salt Cellars.

Codicil to the last will and Testament of M. M. Walker, made this 19th day of June 1827. To wit:

In attestation of the foregoing will, I hereby revoke the gift of the value of my boy William, Polly's son, to my daughter, Louisa M. Swift; and give and bequeath the same to my grand son Thomas Swift, to be paid him by my son Julius, under the same limitations as previously bequeathed to his mother.

I also give and bequeath to my grand daughter, Elizabeth Har- grett, the daughter of my son Julius, Abby's infant child (Elizabeth) not previously disposed of. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal the day and date first above written.
