In the name of God A-men. I Sarah Fair of Wilmington being sick and weak in body, but of sound mind and memory, do make this my last Will and Testament in manner following In primis. I give and bequeath unto my Servant Henry De Bois, my two negroes named Sydney and Belinda, and their increase to her, and her heirs forever.

Item. I give and bequeath unto Thomas MacLaine my two negroes named Lucy and Betty, with their increase, to him and his heirs forever, likewise I give unto the said Thomas, the amount of a bond due by Archibald MacLaine a son of the Executor of the late James Moran with all the interest due thereon.

Item. I give and bequeath unto my good friend Mrs. Pooney, such part of my worked Muslin as she may choose, and a Seal, the word of which is lost, also any of my trinkets she may choose, and such part of my wearing apparel as she thinks worth her acceptance.

Item. I give and bequeath unto Thomas MacLaine a son of a lot in the town of Wilmington, adjoining the house in which I now

Meek, now lives, also my lands in Anson County or elsewhere, to
him and his heirs forever, and hereby declare him to be my attorney
unto. I hereby nominate and appoint the said Thomas Macclaine
to be Executor of this my last Will and Testament, hereby revoking all

Summary Term 1782

The above last Will and Testament of
Sarah Harris was exhibited in Court, and proved by the oaths of
Henry Toomer, a subscribing witness thereto, who swore that the Testator
did sign, seal, publish and declare the same to be and contain her
last Will and Testament, and that he believes she was of sound and
disposing mind and memory. Also that Mary Toomer, signed at
the same time as a concouring evidence thereto. At same time the
Macclaine qualified as Executor to the said Will, ordered that
letters testamentary issued to the said Thomas Macclaine agreeable to
law.

In the name of God Amen. I, Onesimus Futch
being through the abundant mercy and goodness of God, though
weak in body, yet of a sound and perfect understanding and
memory, do constitute this my last Will and Testament and desire
it may be received by all as such.

First. I most humbly beseech my soul to God my maker, per-
ceiving his most gracious acceptance of it through the all sufficient
merits and mediation of my most compassionate redeemer
Jesus Christ, I give my body to the earth from whence it was
taken in full assurance of its resurrection from thence at the
last day. As to my burial, I desire it may be decent, at the
discretion of my dear wife.

As to my worldly estate, I give to my dear, and loving wife during
her widowhood the house wherein I now dwell, with all the furni-
ture, and the lands and tenements that lie about it, with my
stock of hogs, cattle and sheep.

I give to my son Martin one hundred acres of land lying on the
east side of Savoy's Creek, —
I give to my son James one hundred acres of land lying on the West
