

In the name of God Amen. Know all men by these presents, that I Thomas O'pon of Wilmington, being of sound mind and memory, but weak in body, do make this my last Will and Testament in manner, and form following, Viz,

I do leave all my estate of whatever kind or kinds it may be to my daughter, Janet O'pon after the payment of my funeral charges and just debts. And as there is a sum of ninety pounds or upwards, due from the Sheriff of New Hanover County for an execution against the estate of Andrew Randerson dec^d, which property has been sold to satisfy the same, it's my desire that my Executors do lay out said sum in negro girls or young wenches for my aforesaid daughter, Janet. It's my desire that my wearing apparel may be sold, and my tools &c, and the monies arising from said sales to be appropriated to my daughter's use as may be necessary for her from time to time. And as my good friend Mrs. Kingsly has a wish to take my daughter and raise her, it is my request that she may have her. And in case my daughter should die before marriage or before she arrives at the age of twenty one, in that case I do leave and bequeath all my estate to my brother, Archibald O'pon in the Shire of Angus in North Britain; and that the same should be remitted him in the best manner my Executors can, so that there might be as little loss as possible in getting the same remitted him.

Lastly. I do appoint and constitute George Logan and Alex^r Hostler as my whole and sole executors to this my last Will and Testament. In witness whereof I have hereunto put my hand and seal this 28th day of October 1789.
