 Gum in the gum Pond Strait - across to Pollock's Line; also
 three negroes, Cedar Venus & Neger boy Roger. also six Cows
 & also the breeding sows & pigs which are on his
 plantation - one feather bed & furniture & two only, Paul's
 worth of household furniture, also six Ewes & the horses
 belonging to his plantation. I have & he hold this lands
 him & his heirs forever.

other lands in the Parish of St. Marks, & County of North
ampton, also eight Cows & calves to have & to hold the same
to him his heirs & assigns.

be divided by any four honest Neighbours, whom my Executors
shall Chosen wthout any order of Court & that they make
return of each Division to the Court & send it to the Constable

I appoint my three sons Henry, Will, Green Will^{rs} & Mount
Will, Executors of this my last will & testament & trustees
for my wife of her dower. My will & desire is that my Executors
have thirty pounds more money each. In witness whereof
I have hereunto set my hand & seal this fourteenth day
of August, in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred
and thirty six.

In the name of God amen. Aged the 21st one thousand seven hundred & Sixty Eight. Joseph Collins of Northampton County being very sick & weak in body, but of perfect mind & memory thanks be unto God, the reverend Calling unto him the mortality of my body, & knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die, do make & ordain this my last will & testament that it is to say, Principally I first of all I give & recommend my soul unto the hand of God that gave it & for my body recommend to the Earth to be buried in a Christian like manner at the Discretion of my Executors, Nothing doubting but at the General Resurrection, I shall receive the same again by the mighty Power of God, and as touching such worldly Estate as it hath pleased God to bestow me with in this Life,

I give the right to my son Joseph. Call it the upper
part of my land to the small branch, that runs thro' my
plantation to a sweet gum in the lower branch, thence to
a cypress the oak, & land several more, to him this time for ever.

I give Shigwath to my daughter Minny, Callie Onekide for a name
to her & for heirs forever.

In the name of God amen, I grave Hill of the Parish of St George
be living in perfect Health & mind be God, Do make this my
last will & testament as follows viz.

I give devise bequeath unto my son Bennet Hill all the tract
of land & plantation at King Ridge, which I purchased of
James Cary jun and all my other Land on the north side of
King Ridge, & also part of my new survey joining
his own Land to W. P. Dalloway, beginning at his own Corner
Junc in the gum bend Strait & across to Dalloway Line; also
three negroes, Cesar Venus & Negro boy Roger, also six Cows
& calves, also the plowing sows & pigs which are on his
plantation, - one feather bed & furniture & twenty pounds
worth of household furniture, also six Ewes & the horses
belonging to his plantation. To have & to hold the same to
him & his heirs forever.

I then I give bequeath unto my ~~son~~ ^{son} Bennet Hill two hundred
fifty pounds of gold & silver money; also my horse chaise &
my riding Chair & harness, and all the remainder part of
my Estate to be kept together till the interest thereof dis-
charges all my just debts. I then all that part of my Estate
to be equally divided between my wife Grace Hill & my son
William Hill, my Daughter Mary Hill, my Daughter
Sarah Hill my Daughter Temperance Hill, & my Son
John Elizabeth Hill, To have & to hold the same to them
& their heirs forever.

I then I give devise bequeath unto my son William Hill
the land & plantation wherein he now lives, & all my
other Lands in the Parish aforesaid, & County of North
ampton, also eight Cows & calves to have & to hold the same
to him & his heirs forever.

My will & desire is that that part of my Estate left to be
be divided by my four honest Neighbours, whom my Executors
shall Chosen without any order of Court & that they make
return of such Division to the Court. And so constitute

Joseph Collier's Will

In the name of God amen, I Joseph Collier of Northampton County
being very sick & weak in body, but of perfect mind & memory
thanks be unto God, therefore calling unto me the mortal
ity of my body, & knowing that it is appointed for all men
once to die, Do make & ordain this my last will & testament
that is to say, Principally & first of all I give & commend
my soul unto the hand of God that gave it & for my body re-
commend to the earth to be buried in a Christian like manner
at the Discretion of my Executors, Nothing doubting but at the
General Resurrection, I shall receive the same again by the
mighty Power of God, and as touching such worldly Es-

Impunis I bequeath unto my wife beloved wife Sarah Law the use of my land & Plantation where I now live, & also one negro man named Peter one negro man named David, one negro man named Letho, one negro woman named Kate, during her life & then the aforesaid Land & negroes to descend to my Daughter Rebecca Law & her heirs forever.

Item I Give to my wife beloved Daughter Rebecca Law one negro Boy named Hall one negro Girl named Liddy, one negro Girl named Sue, one feather bed & furniture to her & her heirs forever. & in case my said Daughter should die without issue my will & desire is that my whole Estate real & Personal should to my loving wife Sarah Law & her heirs forever.

And lastly I Give to my wife beloved wife Sarah Law all my Estate not before given to her & her heirs forever. & I do nominate & appoint my wife Sarah Law & Henry Gu. Executors & Executors of this my last Will & Testament making all other Wills by me made void, & declaring this to be my last Will & Testament. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand & seal at this 10 day of October in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred & sixty nine signed sealed & delivered in presence of James Law & seal Charles Anderson, John Hawley, John Brogg Northampton County Decr 1st 1769.
