 & Jonas Williams, to him & his heirs forever, whom my said brother

 line westerly to him & his heirs forever.

I give & bequeath to my wife Mildred Hyde three negroes to wit,  
 Jacob Tolly, Curriden during her widowhood & at  
 her marriage & death I give my negro man named
