The will of John Sashly

In the name of god Amen I John Sashly of
Hampton and Province of North Carolina being
in perfectly health and mind memory and calling
to mind the mortality of my body and knowing
that it is appointed for all men Once to die do make
and Ordain this my last will and Testament
this sixteenth day of September one thousand seven
hundred & seventy seven and as it has pleased god
to bless me with a few worldly goods I do give &
bequeath as follows viz. I give my body to be
buried and the cost of my funeral expenses to be paid
at the discretion of my Executors nothing doubting
that principally and first of all I give and

I give and bequeath unto my beloved wife Rebecca Laskley
her negroy follows Diah and Peter to her her heirs
and assigns forever and One feather bed and furniture
a side saddle and a mare named Pompey & chaise
given by her father a Black buckly at her gown & other
two dishes two basins and six plates of her choice also
One negro girl named Rhinok I lend to her during
her life or widowhood and of her her dower to be equally
divided amongst my children sold to the highest bidder
I also lend three cows and calves two sows and pigs
two head of young hogs during her life and at her
decease to be sold to the highest bidder the money
Equally divided as before mentioned also all the other
stock of hogs pigs cattle and sheep and to wares
and One negro slave Bodan and household
furniture to be sold at public sale and the
money arising to pay my debts and the remainder
equally divided between my two Daughters Nancy
Laskley and Rebecca Laskley

Item I do give and bequeath unto my son William
Laskley two Negroes Liza and Hannah to
and the tract of Land I am now possessed
with Pease Hill Creek to him and his heirs
forever

Item I do give and bequeath unto my Daughter Sarah
Laskley two Negroes Hannah & Betty to her and
her heirs forever

Item I do give and bequeath unto my Daughter
Rebecca Laskley One negro Maack Mittie
and her by and to her and her heirs forever

Item my will and desire is that all the Menthalls
belonging to the plantation use should
be left to them for the service of my wife
such as plows Axes broad and narrow Hoes
to her ^{heirs} and assigns forever and I
do hereby make and Revocate all former

will heretofore made by me or others and I do
hereby appoint my friend Owen Myrick and
James Johnston my whole and Sole Executors
of this my Last will and Testament

Mark Philips Will

brother Thomas Philips my whole and
