

Wilson Ruttands Will

In the NAME of God AMEN. I Wilson Ruttand of the County of Southampton
County and State of North Carolina being sick & weak of perfect mind & memory
thank be given unto God calling unto mind the mortality of my body & knowing
that it is appointed for all men once to die, do make and publish this my last will & Testament
and as Touching such worldly Estate where withal I have pleased God to bestow me with
I send unto my Beloved wife Wilson Ruttand hereinafter named Wilson Ruttand
during her Natural life also one dish & one Chair also the plantation wherein
I live in and all the land lying on the North side of Hatteras Swamp during her natural
life provided she is to baptize my son Wilson Ruttand & give him sufficient
education which he comes to the age of maturity — God give unto my beloved wife
Wilson Ruttand one Bed & furniture, one Table two Chests five Cows & calves two
Horse Twenty head of hogs five head of Sheep three Pigs two does two Frunderlings
three weanling hogs two Iron pots two Dishes Seven pair Linen & Hogs two puer
dishes & two pair of Barns & a Hining Whet to last her Riving for ever

Secondly I give & bequeath unto my Daughter Charity Ruttand two Negroes named Stephen
and Whitney, one bed and furniture, one Cow and Calf to her forever
to her forever & also I send unto my Daughter Charity one Small room of my house
during the time that she may live & she shall receive the same of me
I give and bequeath unto my Daughter Anna Ruttand one Piece of land
lying on the South side of Hatteras Swamp which Land I purchased of Henry Cotton
also one negro Boy named Bill two Cows Sixty two hogs & Piggy the Riddle & Birds
to her this Rives for ever — also one Bed & furniture
I give and bequeath unto my beloved Son John Ruttand all the Lands
that I have but my wife after her Death also Two Negroes named Lucy & Isaac
one Dish & one Chair to him and his heirs forever after the Death of my beloved
wife also one bed and furniture

I make and witness my Friend William Granbury my Esq: to this My last Will &
Testament in Writing whereof I have set my hand and seal the 18 day
of June 1802 —

Mary Branch's Will

I Mary Branch of N. Carolina being weak in body but
of sound Memory and perfectly in my sense, do make this my
last will and Testament in manner and form as follows. To my
I give and bequeath to my Daughter Mary Jordan my Negro boy
the name of Rachel, and my Bay Mare to her the Negro woman
I give and bequeath to my Son James Branch all my right and
title to the Land whereon I now live & the Log house thereon
purchased for him, Fifty head of Hogs & Fifteen head of Cattle, my
Negro, Ben & J. J. and all my Dwelling house hold furniture
I give and bequeath to my Daughter Rebecca Branch my Negro woman
my Duck house & Young of Bay Mule & Riding Chow to her & her surviving son
I give & bequeath to my Daughter Sally Branch my Negro Lucy & Caster
and my Black Cattl. fifty, to her the Negro Chow

I give & bequeath to my Daughter Christian my Negro Whitney One
Bay filly & fifty Pounds Peignoir Curragh to her & her heirs forever
I leave my Land in Virginia to be sold by my Executor & the Proceeds
to be used to the best advantage and the Money so gained to be divided amongst all
my before mentioned children, a sum able from my husband & wife.

It is my will and Desire that all the remaining part of my Property
of every kind be sold and after the payment of my Just Debts to be equally
Divided amongst all my before mentioned Children, I nominate Sophia,
Isaac Parker Esquire to this my Last Will & Testament & Lawke General
all wills & gifts here to be made by me in Writing whereof I have
hereunto set my hand & affixed my seal this 18 day of October 1802
