Some time preceding his death in his last sickness gave unto his wife Sarah Moore Twenty Bushells of Wheat, divided unto his Son John Moore his Negro Dick, Black Pot, and that he further wished his requests to be taken as part of his last Will & Testament which was proved the last given under our hands this day & year above.

Turner Bridgers's Will

In the town of St. Louis I Turner Bridgers of Anthraphon County of Mo. being at this time in a low state of health and of sound mind & memory, my wife and I have after all my just debts are paid signed my purposes as following—
I give & bequeath unto my brother William Bridgers his share in the land of St. Louis, Pointe Mourey, River, James, Sacks, River, & Sugar, River, Sacks, River, & Sacks, to him and his heirs forever—
I give & bequeath unto my friend and neighbor James Day four hundred and fifty dollars to him & his heirs forever—
I give & bequeath on half of all my land unto my brother William Bridgers to him & his heirs forever—
I give on half of my land unto John Webb Bridgers to him and his heirs forever—
I further give unto my brother William Bridgers all the rest of my property he have and his heirs forever—
I do hereby constitute and appoint my brother William Bridgers Executor of this my last Will and Testament in which I have signed these bequests to my land and seal this 13 day of March 1804
