 second married and being willing to mind the destiny of my
 said wife, knowing it is of great use for her to and her
 to make & receive this my last will & Testament forth of all
 business and my soul into the hands of God who gave it my
 Body I do make of the with from hence it was taken and
 touching such matter estate as it hath pleased God to
 bless me with in this life I give, devise & dispose of the same

In the manner following —

My wife is that all my last Debt be paid —
 And to my beloved wife Elizabeth Morris the sum of £1000 in
 which I have lived and one hundred and fifty acres the
 lower part of the Smiths tract adjoining the same tract
 also the following slaves to wit Henry, George, Mary, John and
 Phelly, four horses namely the ones I have kept, one saddle
 a barrel by the name of Shaver & one Key ball. Please
 the boys and calves & four young cattle, the cows four being
 and three at the time this Thomas James of part
 Park and twenty five barrels being four hundred weight
 of Park for the covered in bass he lives with his four of
 the house furniture & furniture half dozen sitting chairs
 one desk and Mahogany table one iron pot one iron pan
 one kettle one kettle one boiler kettle one very cooking
 chair & many among his natural life and at his death
 give him one gold & silver & the last one have back at during
 his natural life, and at his death the above property
 to be sold and the monies arising therefrom to be equally
 divided between my four children namely William, Elizabeth
