 being sick and weak in Body but in perfect Sense and disposing Memory
 of Mine think it to God for the same and Calling to mind that
 it is appointed for all Men once to Die do make and give this my
 last Will and Testament in Manner and Form following. I give
 Here I give to my Daughter Rebecca Johnson five Shillings to her and
 her heirs forever
 Here I give to my son David Johnson five Shillings to him and his
 heirs forever
 Here I give to my Daughter Amy Pops five Shillings to
 her and her heirs forever
 Here I give to my Daughter Elizabeth Gray five Shillings
 My Will and desire is that said half of my Negro Chattel
 Peggy and Jack and Shavis one half of the Remainder
 of my Movable property to be equally Divided among
 my Love Children Robert Johnson, Rebecca Johnson, Susant
 Vivster, and Charlotte Maxwell and the other half of the
 afore Mentioned property I give to my beloved Wife Amy
 Johnson during her life and after her decease that the
 Remainder of said Property to be equally Divided among
 my four said Children as the afore mentioned half
 of my Estate is my Will and desire; and the hereby Court
 here and appoint my beloved son Bernaba Johnson and
 Robert Johnson my whole and sole Executors and Curators
 of this my last Will and Testament, In Witness
 whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this
 27th day of October one thousand Eight hundred and

 I William Wimborn of State of North Carolina and County of
 Pamlico being of sound and perfect Mind and Memory
 do hereby do this 27th day of November in the year of our Lord
 one thousand eight hundred and six years make publish this my last Will and
 Testament in Manner following that is to say. I give my Will is that all my
 last Debts with my funeral Expenses be paid
 Here I give unto my loving Wife Sarah Wimborn the whole of my estate
 real and personal during her Natural life then to my Children
 following. I give unto my Son William Wimborn the upper
 part of my land which lies East West line, together with two acres of
 purchase of Walter Beards a piece of land lying on Banks
 Swamp. I give unto my Son James Wimborn one hundred
 Acre of land between here & Doughty Bay to him his heirs forever
 Here I give & devise unto my Son Doughty Wimborn the middle part
 of my land lying between here & Doughty Bay to him his heirs forever
 Here I give & devise unto my Son John Wimborn the lower part of my land
 lying between here & Doughty Bay to him his heirs forever
 Here I give & devise unto my Son John Wimborn the lower part of my land
 lying between here & Doughty Bay to him his heirs forever
 Here I give & devise unto my Son Henry Wimborn the lower part of my land
 lying between here & Doughty Bay to him his heirs forever
 Here I give & devise unto my three Daughters Ann, Susan, & Sophia &
 Dolly Wimborn all my young Negroes, after the decease of my wife to
 be equally Divided amongst them by lot. If any should be
 born after the death of my Wife, they are to be divided in the same
 manner. My Will and desire is that my old Negro Man and
 should have her own Freedom of choice to live with whomsoever of
 my Children suits her best. My Will and desire is after the death
 of my Wife all the remaining part of my Estate to be equally Divided
 amongst all my Children here & there alike, and thereby make
 and make my Son William Wimborn & my Grand Children
 Executors of this my last Will & Testament, In Witness whereof
 I have hereunto set my hand & seal this 27th day of November
