In the name of god amen I Jincy Brantley of Northampton County North Carolina being very sick and weak in body but of perfect mind and memory thanks be given given unto god, calling unto mind the mortality of my body and knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die, do make and ordain this my last will and testament, that is to say principally and first of all I give and recommend my soul into the hand of almighty god that gave it and my body I recommend to the earth to be buried in decent Christian burial at the direction of my Executors and as touching my worldly estate wherewith I have pleased God to bless me in this life, I give, devise, and dispose of the same in the following manner and form-

First I give unto my son Ethelred S. Brantley two negro boys Mark and Peter and if he die without a lawful heir to return to my other children - I then give unto my son William Brantley and negro boy John at his coming of age or marrying - I then give unto my daughter Puffelia Brantley one negro girl Jincy and her increase at her coming of lawful age or marrying and should she die without a lawful heir of her body begotten then the above negro Jincy and her increase to be equally divided amongst William Jincy Rebecca Brantley - I then give unto Jincy H. Brantley my daughter one negro girl Mary and her increase at her coming of lawful age or marrying and should she die without a lawful heir of her body begotten then the above negro and her increase to be divided between Puffelia, William and Rebecca Brantley - I then give unto my daughter Rebecca Brantley one negro girl Lydia and her increase at her coming of lawful age or marriage and should she die without a lawful heir of her body begotten to return to Puffelia, William and Jincy H. Brantley - I then I leave my two old negroes

Sam and Lydia to make their own choice which of my children Puffelia, William Jincy H. and Rebecca Brantley they will live with as my wish is for them both to go together - The balance of my property not named after paying all my just debts to be equally divided between Puffelia, William, Jincy H. and Rebecca Brantley when Rebecca becomes of lawful age for marriage - My wish is that the negroes which will be mixed out to choose their own homes as it is my wish for them not to be ill treated - I likewise appoint James H. Wood my sole Executor to this my last will and testament in witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this thirty first day of January in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and Twenty six

Thirdly I give unto my grand daughter Deborah Elizabeth Smith one negro woman named Agg also one negro child named Dey also one pig also one cat also one Mammal pable also one chest to her and her heirs forever - Fourthly I give unto daughter Susan Lapsford the wife of Roston Lapsford one negro woman named Minny also one negro girl named Martha also one Red parrot and said Roston Lapsford will pay my grand son Nicholas Boon five hundred and fifty Dollars to her and her heirs forever.

Fifthly It is my will and desire that all my property not willed
in my after paying my just debts be equally divided between my
two daughters Lida Smith and Susanna Lapelet to them and
their heirs forever - Sixthly I do nominate Miller Eubank and
Bartlett Lapelet my two Executors of this my last will and testament
with full confidence they will carry the same into full execution and
I do hereby acknowledge this above to be my last will and testament

I Frederick Long of Northampton County State of North
Carolina being of sound mind and disposing memory, do make and
ordain this my last will and testament in manner and form as
follows - I give I send to my wife Rebecca Long as my Estate
both real and personal during her life or widowhood except one
tract of land called the Mount Forest containing one hundred and
fifty acres more or less, one Black and furniture, & one Cow & half which
said tract of land, bed and furniture & Cow & half I give to
my supposed daughter Harriet Strickling, also I give my son
William Long Five hundred Dollars for the use of his negro man
Abner, but it is my will and desire that if my said son William
Long should claim more than that sum for the use of his negro
that he chase not him any part of my estate - It is my will
and desire that my Executors hereafter appointed shall sell any
part of my Estate, that shall may think proper so that all my

other property land or negroes be the same amount for the benefit
of my children. In the event that my wife should marry, then
I trust her son third part of my estate both real and personal -
It is my wish that if my wife die before any of my children arrive
to the age of Twenty one year that my friend Lettichy Long shall
have the management of my estate - I hereby nominate and appoint
my wife Rebecca Long my Executors, hereby revoking all other wills
