

Miss Collier's Will. In the name of God Amen. I Sops Collier of the County of Northampton and State of North Carolina being of sound mind and memory blessed be God, do this first day of January in the year of our Lord 1814 do make and publish this my last Will & Testament in manner following that is to say-

Item I send unto my beloved wife Mary Collier all my property both real and personal during her natural life & after her death it is my will and desire that Elizabeth Collier should have one bed & furniture and one year's schooling, to her and her heirs forever.

Item It is my will & desire that after the death of my wife all the property that I have lent her except the bed & furniture given to Elizabeth Collier should be equally divided between my three sons Sops Joseph and Sil & them and their heirs forever.

Item It is my will and desire that my son Sops Collier should pay unto my son Joseph seven dollars out of the property I have given him, also it is my will and desire that my son Sil Collier should pay to my son Joseph Collier two dollars as I have given them to that amount more than Joseph. And I hereby make and declare my beloved wife Mary Collier executrix of this my last and Testament in writing whereof the said Sops Collier has to this my last Will and Testament set my hand & seal this day & year above written -

Signed, sealed, published, declared, by the said Sops Collier (read) Sops Collier the Testator as his last Will & Testament in the presence of us, who were present at the time of signing & sealing thereof Rayton Maughon, Micajah Conner Simon Harris -

Northampton March 1st 1814 This last Will & Testament of Sops Collier dec'd was exhibited in open Court and proved by the oaths of Rayton Maughon & Simon Harris subscribing witnesses thereto and at June Court 1814 Mary Collier the Executrix therein named came into Court & was qualified - Ordered to be certified and recorded -

James Horeca's Will. In the name of Almighty God Amen. I James Horeca of the County of Northampton in the State of North Carolina deeply impressed with the thoughts of the uncertainty of life, have made this my last Will and Testament. I give and bequeath unto my beloved wife Mary Horeca one of a new and one riding chair two feather beds

and furniture and one negro girl Elyse to her and her heirs forever. I give also to my beloved daughter Mary Horeca one feather bed & furniture and eight dollars to her and her heirs forever. I leave to my beloved son James Horeca one feather bed & furniture one filling bed & one saddle and one coat. I give to my beloved son Thomas Horeca one negro man Caesar to him & his heirs forever. It is my desire that the said negro Caesar may be valued at three hundred dollars and then for my wife Mary - my daughter Mary Scarborough my daughter Mary and my son James each of them to draw out of my estate in proportion to the valuation of said negro Caesar. It is my desire after all my just debts be paid that the residue of my estate real and personal may be sold & equally divided between my dear wife and all my children. The legacy I leave my son James it is my desire that my son Thomas may take it in his hands and dispose of it as he sees fit, and if he should die without an heir legitimate by his body that the said legacy may go to my son Thomas: and I do appoint my friend Jacob Liles and Elijah Scarborough my executors to this my last Will & Testament. I do revoke & cancel all Wills by me heretofore made and so by their parents acknowledge this my last Will and Testament written with my own hand and signed this 3^d of January one thousand eight hundred & fourteen

I Winborne Jenkins of Northampton County and State of North Carolina being weak in body but of sound mind and memory thanks be to almighty God for the same do this 25th day of February in the year 1814 make and publish this my last Will & Testament in manner following, viz. Item I send unto my beloved wife Susanna Jenkins the land and plantation where I now live known by the name of the Old Manor Plantation, and five negroes viz. Amy, George, Peter, Sam, and Mazar during her natural life and after her death the five negroes as above named to be equally divided among all my children to them and their heirs forever. Item I give and bequeath unto my daughter Elizabeth Tuttle wife of David
