Item 3rd. — I give and bequeath unto my son Davis Bryan six hundred Weight of Pork and six barrels of Corn, I wish it to be given to him by the winter of eighteen hundred and twenty five.

Item 4th. — I give and bequeath unto my son Davis Bryan's two children half of the money that I may get from Miles Watson's estate, to be given by him unto them by my executor when obtained.

Item 5th. — I give and bequeath unto my son Samuel Long one set of Stearpoons and one Machog only I will I will also all of my crop of Cotton planted on the Ground which I bought from him provided he will cultivate it if not I give and bequeath it unto Joseph Griffin for Cultivating covering one fourth part to pay Sarah Long for the rent. —

Item 6th. — I give and bequeath unto my daughter Nancy Gaffin one negro woman named Sally one gegg and Harney all of my stock of horses and mules all of my stock of Cattle all of my stock of hogs both at this place and the quarter. All of my working tools and plow gear ^{at} all of my crop both at this place and the plantation also all of my household furniture of every description also all my Kitchen pots, tubs and lumber of every description. — Item 7th. — I wish all of my debts to be paid by Debts which I owe. — Item 8th. — I also give and bequeath unto John Bryan his bond until the first day of January eighteen hundred and twenty six. — Lastly. — I do hereby nominate and appoint Joseph Griffin my Executor to this my last will and Testament. In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and affixed my seal the day and date before written.
