 River one bed and furniture to me best to be
 assigns forever. Also give and bequeath unto
 and one furniture and one bed to him his heirs
 Also give and bequeath unto my son James R.
 that I have given to him the sum of one hundred
 is that my son John River should give my
 of fifty dollars in part of what he is owing my son
 if my son John River has any objection to giving
 sixty dollars above the value my will is that my son
 have five acres of my land, & also give and bequeath unto my
 son John River one half of my land & also one bed furniture
 and one horse and his heirs and assigns

bequeath unto my dear beloved wife Elizabeth River all the residue of
 my parishable estate that is except what I have already willed away
 both in word and act during her natural life by paying to her
 fifteen pety dollars that I have already willed her also my will is
 that my wife Elizabeth River should have the power & benefit of the
 other half of house that I have not before willed away & also the house
 that willed away to my son John River that my wife Elizabeth
 River have the liberty of getting married, widows & bond & lightwood
 for her own good during her natural life & after her decease my will
 and desire is that my son Elizabeth herself, when Mary says to
 John River should have this same half of land that I have willed

 land to be paid for her by my Executors for her to build her own house to
 live in during her natural life but if my said daughter should not be
 left a widow then she had no right in my land. Item I bequeath
 to my two daughters Sarah Thorne and Elizabeth Thorne the land and plantation
 known known here to be equally divided between them at the death of my
 wife to them their heirs and assigns forever. Item All the remainder of
 my Estate I give and bequeath to my two daughters Sarah Thorne & Elizabeth
 Thorne to be equally divided between them both money & every other article
 of property within doors and without I give and bequeath to my said two
 daughters Sarah & Elizabeth Thorne to be equally divided between them
 and by them freely to be possessed and enjoyed forever. After the remainder
 of my children I have already given them what I think I intend for them.
