State of North Carolina *S* March Court 1825.

The last will and Testament of Joseph Pennell deceased was further proved in open court by the Oath of Benjamin Jenkins one of the subscribing witnesses thereto, who made oath he did sign the same as his last will and Testament in his presence, and that at the time he signed it he believed him to be capable of making just dispositions of his property whereupon this probate was ordered to be certified and entered of record.

Barnaba Burn's Will. — In the name of God Amens! I Barnaba Burn of the County of Northampton & State of North Carolina being weak in body — health but in perfect sense and sound mind do make and ordain this my last will of what earthly goods that has been bestowed on — I give in manner and form as followeth. — Item — I give and bequeath unto my two supposed sons Ransom Pope and Levy Pope my land and plantation wherein I live containing one hundred acres more or less to — Equally divided ~~by~~ in quantity between them Levy to have the lot wherein my dwelling house stands to him & their heirs forever with this exception that — shall support Rebecca Pope during her single life. — Item. — It is my will to desire that their Mother should live with one or both of them & should should have her support likewise. — Item. — I give and bequeath to Rebecca Pope one son & man the said man to stay on my plantation to work for the support of my family and when the man should be worn out or dead the aforesaid Ransom Pope & Levy Pope shall be bound to make up to him in Stock or money to the amount of sixty Dollars at the said Rebecca coming of age. Item. — I give the balance of Estate both within & out doors that has not already been named to Ransom Pope Levy Pope & Rebecca Pope the property to stay together ^{until} they come of age

and then to be equally divided between them to them and their heirs forever. And further I nominate and appoint my friend William Wade my Executor to this my last will and Testament revoking all other wills made by me. In witness I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 5th day of February 1821
