- 6th I give unto Nathaniel Smith five shillings -
- 7th I give unto Nancy Jenkins five shillings -
- 8th I give unto my daughter Mary Sikes one negro man named Bob nine head of cattle twelve head of sheep six head of hogs one feather bed and furniture three iron pots two dishes twenty eight cyder casks five dishes six basins eight plates nine jugs eight chairs three trunks three chests or boxes and all the balance of my estate not already given away to her & her heirs forever - I also do appoint my friend Thomas Sikes sole & sole executor of this my last will & Testament. In the name of God Amen I George Key of the County of Nathampton State of North Carolina being very weak and low but of sound mind and memory do constitute my last will and Testament in form and manner following viz my will & devise is for all my property to be sold at twelve months credit and for all my just debts to be paid, my wife and devise is for my wife Gamina C. Key to have the balance of my estate after paying my just debts, as witness I have hereunto set my hand & seal after first appointing my brother Samuel Key my executor to manage my affairs, this 24th day of November 1815 -

Cordal Bynum's Will. State of North Carolina N^o 20mpton County. In the name of God Amen Cordal Bynum of said County and State being of sound mind and memory do this day constitute this my last will and Testament in manner and form as followeth to wit, —

1st I give and bequeath unto my daughter Nancy Jordan as followeth one negro man named Guid one negro girl named Caroline one negro woman named Sarah and her child James them if their increase to her and her heirs forever, also one feather bed & furniture.

2nd I give and bequeath to Thomas Bynum one middle boy Perry one sorrel filley Woodpecker one barrel brassy still one rifle two shot guns one feather bed to him and his heirs forever.

3rd I give and bequeath unto my daughter Polly Bynum one negro girl named Theresa one feather bed & furniture to her and her heirs forever —

4th I lend to my wife Elizabeth Bynum after my just debts are paid all the rest of the property I do own and possess with for the use of her for the in main tained and living up my children Thomas and Polly until Thomas Bynum arrives to the age of twenty one years, if said Thomas does arrive at that age my will and desire is that then said Thomas Bynum shall take possession of all the land I now do possess with for him and his heirs forever on conditions if his mother and sister Polly are living at the time he arrives to the above age of twenty one years that his said mother and sister Polly shall have the liberty of one half the land & all the buildings I now possess during the life of his said mother —

5th My will and desire is that when my son Thomas Bynum arrives to the age of twenty one years or at the death of his mother if previous to that age of twenty one years an equal division of all the rest of property not before given away be equally divided among them or the survivors of them namely my wife Elizabeth Bynum, John B. Jordan Thomas Bynum & Polly Bynum to them and their heirs forever — said property given away as above mentioned except land still owed fore arms to be brought

brought forward to make an equal division as possible without sale of possible. 7th I nominate and appoint my friends Alford Cherry and John B. Jordan execs. this my last will and testament. Also my desire is that Hardy Butcher, Ezzum Hollamon, Borer Branch James H. Wood and Everett Starnell or any three of them divide said property as this will directs. In witness whereof I Cordal Bynum have this 22nd day of January 1815 set my hand and seal —

James Granberry's Will. I James Granberry of the County of Nathampton and State of North Carolina being sick and weak but of strong mind and memory do make and ordain this my last will and Testament in manner and form following viz:

Item 1st I wish all my just debts to be paid. Item 2nd I lend unto my loving wife Bonelope Granberry all my lands, eleven negroes viz. Nelon, Hester, Guy, Will, Coll, Penny, Henry, Tom, Phoby, Frey and Cherry all my household and kitchen furniture six choice cows and calves six ewes and lambs, Buckit Mare Guy Mare & my black horse six sows and their pigs & all my fowls of every kind. Item 3rd I give and bequeath unto my living wife Bonelope Granberry as a support for herself & my children for one year one hundred bushels corn, three thousand pounds pork, one hundred pounds sugar and twenty pounds Coffee. Item 4th After the death of my wife Bonelope Granberry I wish my lands sold by my executors hereafter to be named. Item 5th After the death of my wife Bonelope Granberry I give and bequeath unto my children viz Mary Mastet, Elizabeth Hempstead, James Granberry, John Granberry Louisa Granberry, Tobitha Granberry, Keatilda Granberry Rebecca Granberry, and Sally Granberry all the balance of my estate after paying my just debts to be equally divided among them all share and share alike except my share for Mary Mastet and for her share to be three hundred dollars less in value to either of my other children in consequence of a negro boy I gave her
