Finnie one of the subscribing witnesses thereto, at the same time Betty Roper qualified as executrix thereto, time being allowed Sally Roper the other executrix in said will named to qualify accordingly, - ordered that said will be recorded. - Teste, James C. I Henry Thompson of the County of Northampton in the State of North Carolina being at present in perfect health and sound mind and Memory, think it to God thought, Best settling to mind the Mortality of my Body, doth give and dispose of my Goods & what else in manner and form following - Item I leave unto my beloved wife Amey Thompson, my Son Saml Thompson, & my three Daughters Melly Thompson, Lovrett Thompson, Nancy Thompson, the value of all my Property that I own papered with at this time in the County and State above mentioned, consisting of my Land and Plantation whereon I now live, and all my Household & Kitchen Furniture whatsoever, and Bed and their Furniture, and all my Tools, & all my Plantation Utensils, and all my Stock of all kinds Horses, Cattle, Sheep, Hogs &c and every thing that I am now possessed with to my beloved wife Amey Thompson, to my Son Saml Thompson, my three Daughters Melly Thompson, Lovrett Thompson, Nancy Thompson, as long as they may live a Single or Natural Life together on the Land and Plantation I now live on to their use and benefit &c. Item I give and bequeath, to the longest liver of my above named children, Lovrett Thompson, Melly Thompson, Lovrett

Thompson, Nancy Thompson, all the above mentioned property, consisting of my Plantation and Land whereon I now live, and all my House hold and Kitchen Furniture whatsoever, and Bed and Furniture and all my Tools & all my Plantation Utensils, and every Stock of all kind Horses, Cattle, Sheep, Hogs &c, and every thing that I am now possessed with, to the one above named whichever it may be that may be the longest liver of these my four children, my Son Saml Thompson, three Daughters Melly Thompson, Lovrett Thompson, Nancy Thompson, to the one which ever it may be, to them and their heirs forever - Item I give and bequeath, to my beloved Son Henry Thompson one dollar to him and his heirs forever, Item I give and bequeath unto my beloved Son John Thompson one dollar to him and his heirs forever. And I do constitute and appoint my Son Saml Thompson executor of this my last will and testament, making void all other Wills by me heretofore made, In witness whereof I have hereunto set my Hand and seal this thirty first day of March one thousand eight Hundred and Sixteen. Holloman one bed and Furniture, to her and her heirs forever - I give unto Leary & M. White one bed & Furniture to her & her heirs forever - It is my desire that the Residue of my Estate may be sold and after all my just debts being paid, it is my desire that the balance may be equally divided between Susannah Kirby, and Joyce Kirby, Benjamin Kirby, Archibald Kirby, Thomas Kirby, and Miss Kirby - I do appoint James C. Harrison to this my last will and testament, and do revoke and cancel all wills by me heretofore made, and do by these presents acknowledge this my last will and testament written this twentieth day of July in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred & sixteen Joyce Long (Red)
