Frederick Long's Will. In the name of god I Frederick Long of Northampton County State of North Carolina being of sound mind and disposing memory, do make and ordain this my last will and testament in manner and form as follows - I give I lend to my wife Rebecca Long all my Estate both real and personal during her life or widowhood except one tract of land called the Shackle Ford containing one hundred and fifty acres more or less, one B. & and furniture & one Cow & calf which said tract of land, bed and furniture & Cow & calf I give to my approved daughter Hannah Strutting also I give my son William Long Five hundred Dollars for the use of his negro man Moom, but it is my will and desire that if my said son William Long should claim more than that sum for the use of his negro that he shall not have any part of my estate. It is my will and desire that my Executors hereafter appointed shall sell any part of my Estate, that they may think proper so that the Long

this property land or negroes to the same amount for the benefit of my children. In the event that my wife should marry, then I shall have one third part of my estate both real and personal. It is my wish that if my wife die before any of my children arrive to the age of Twenty one years that my friend Lettaby Long shall have the management of my estate. I hereby nominate and appoint my wife Rebecca Long my Executrix hereby revoking all other wills made by me.
