Kirby, Benjamin Kirby, Archibald Kirby, Thomas Kirby, and Miss Mary, all of the State of Tennessee I do appoint and constitute my Executor to this my last will and testament, and do revoke and cancel all wills by me heretofore made, and as by these Presents acknowledges this my last will and testament written this twentieth day of July in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred & sixteen.
