Martha Blanchard one negro girl named Rhode at my wife's decease
Also I give and bequeath unto my daughter Elizabeth one negro boy na-
med Hardy after my wife's decease Also I give and bequeath unto my

wife's decease Also I give and bequeath unto my daughter Mary
one negro boy named Sparrow at my wife's decease also I give
