

between my said son and daughter Cuttell, also all my interest right and title to all the negroes purchased of John Carrol (the said Carrol claiming the same under my father's will) to my said son William his heirs and assigns forever, also all the property my said son carried with him when he left me. Seventy. I lend my daughter Martha Wright during her life two negroes Olive and Pipp, with their increase from the date hereof together with all the property she carried away with her previous to her last marriage; if my said daughter should die leaving a child or children I give the property herein lent her to such child or children to him or them and their heirs forever. Eighty. I lend my daughter Elizabeth Lapifer two negroes Hannah and Hark with their increase from the date hereof, also two cows and calves one chest one bed and furniture, all her own choice, to my said daughter during her natural life; if my said daughter should die leaving a child or children, then I give the property herein lent her to such child or children to him or them their heirs and assigns forever. Ninety. I give and devise unto my son Jope Lapifer all my lands that I have not already given or lent away, and at the death or marriage of my wife, I give my said Jope the lands and plantation I have but my wife lying in the facts of the roads wherein my dwelling house stands; also I give my said son the following negroes Peter Shearack Egg (the elder) Alton and Almon, two cows and calves (say second choice) one bed and furniture (second choice) one mare called the Ashy Billy, with the increase of the said negroes from the date hereof, to my said son Jope his heirs & assigns forever. Tenthly. I give to my daughter Elizabeth Lapifer one colt called the tiny colt. Eleventhly. It is my further will and desire that my wife Sally pay all my just debts and funeral expenses out of such of my property as I have not already willed away, and the balance if any remaining, to remain in her possession and be at her disposal during her life; and at the death or marriage of my said wife it is my will and desire that the negroes herein before lent her shall be equally divided among my following children Willie, Enos, Williams and Mary the wife of Willie Cuttell, to them their heirs and assigns forever. Lastly I do nominate my wife Sally Lapifer the only executrix of this my last will and testament, with full confidence that she will carry the same into full execution, and I do hereby acknowledge this alone to be my last will and testament. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and affixed my seal this nineteenth day of April 1816.

of body but of perfect sound mind and memory thanks be to almighty God for this same but calling to mind the mortality of my body knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die, my body I commit to the earth whence it came to be buried in a Christian-like and decent manner at the discretion of my executors and my soul I commit into the hands of God that gave it me, and as touching such worldly estate as it hath pleased God to bless me with I give devise and dispose of in the following manner that is to say Item I lend unto my beloved wife Rachael Woodard the use of my land and plantation containing two hundred acres to the same rose or less, I also lend her three negroes named Clema, Plina and Calo also two beds and furniture and my household and kitchen furniture and my stock of horses cattle hogs and plantation utensils after paying all my just debts during her natural life and after her decease I give my land and negro boy Calo to my son Samuel Woodard to him and his heirs forever. Item I lend unto my daughter Sylvia Cuttell one negro girl named Cealy during her life and after her decease my will and desire is for the said negro of Cealy to belong to her children to them and their heirs forever. Item I give and bequeath unto my daughter Ann Woodard one negro girl named Blasty also one bed and furniture to her and her heirs forever. Item I give and bequeath unto my daughter Priscilla Woodard one negro girl named Elviry also one bed and furniture to her and her heirs forever. Item my will and desire is what property remains at the death of my beloved wife Rachael Woodard that is not already given away in legacies to be equally divided between all my children all share and share alike them and their heirs forever. And I do hereby nominate and appoint my two sons Lewis Woodard and Jope Woodard my whole and sole executors to this my last will and testament. ~~It is all former wills by me~~

In the name of God Amen I John Nicholas of Northampton County and State of North Carolina being weak in body but of sound mind and memory do make and ordain this my last will & Testament in form and manner following that is to say First I give unto my wife Mary Ann Nicholas three negroes namely old Betty, Jack and Nancy and three beds and furniture her choice, a chest of drawers two wash tubs, tables six Windsor chairs i.e two with arms and two others. I lend unto my said wife the plantation whereon I now live beginning at my house in the little branch and following the side down to the swamp, then down the swamp to Norman Branch; less than Norman Branch, then James Branch then along Branch less to Penderell Branch back to Penderell Branch's line then along Penderell Branch back to the said Norman Branch.
